Philadelphian Sings and Or-

At the third concert of the Philadelphia Prohestra, given yesterday afternoon at he Academy of Music, Mr. Henri Scott, he Philadelphia basso, was the assisting rtist. Mr. Scott has sung in opera before, and is this year under contract to sing with the Metropolitan Opera Com-nany. As good baseos are by no means common, it is certain that Mr. Scott will be heard here often this year. It is none the less fitting that his first appearance of the meason should be with a local ortanization. The program, which ranged from the 18th century, with Gluck, to modern times, with Strauss, will be recented tonight.

It remained for the beautiful legend of the sage brush, which opened to receive the infant Jesus when the proud rose had refused to move him, and se move his hearers to lyric ecstacy. The bass is hardly a chosen metier for this feeling, and Mr. Scott's triumphant achievement of it is wholly and splendily to his credit. It had not the sudden swinging inspiration of a week ago, but it had a fine steadi-ness of good execution and a smooth tone which promises mightily for the future. In the Gluck overture ("Iphlgenie en Aulide") the strings played with all heir best sonority and with a sweep of gesture which were gratifying to sensi-tive eyes and ears. In the Brahms sym-phony (No 2 in D Major) all the choirs were mellow, and on occasions the tonal coloring was inexpressibly beautiful. How Mr. Stokowski and his men engaged to bring to the "Don Juan" overture of Strauss such fresh energies as they did is a puzzle. The audience—as much of it as stayed—was incapable of taking in all that was offered in the tempestuous and swiftly changing moods of this piece. A French critic, obviously Wagnerian, A French critic, obviously standards said of Brahms that he works wonder-fully well with the ideas he lacks. That, fully well with the ideas he lacks. That, in the words of the street, seemed rather thick yesterday afternoon. The second sympliony is almost too full of ideas. Some of them are trivial, but all of them have some beauty, and the depth of feeling of the first and final movements are not surfaces mirrored in deep technicali-ties, but real emotions. The adagio is divided between sentiment—what one called German sentiment before he was afraid to hurt people's feelings—and a gay thoughtfulness. The allegratto is spiritual and charming. The symphony is confessedly one of simple humors—but they are all very human humors, and as such they were played.
