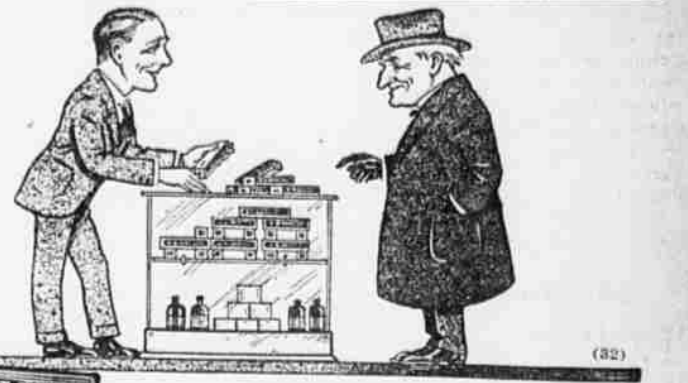
A number of supper parties have been arranged for both nights of the performance, and a dance for the talent and their friends will be given on the night of the second performance.
