to his fate in the home-made trap.




HERE'S A LAST LOOK AT THE OLD IMMIGRATION STATION

At least a million immigrants have landed at the Washington avenue shed since its erection in


1884. The Pennsylvania Railroad, in making improvements, found the structure in the way, so

it is being demolished along with other buildings.




UNCLE SAM SAVES ODDS AND ENDS IN HIS POSTOFFICE.
