Christmas Stickers to Aid Fight Against Tuberculosis

The Red Cross Christmas seals were placed on sale today throughout the city and State. More than 5,000,000 of these holiday stickers have been distributed throughout the city, acording to the Pennsylvania Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, which acts as agent for the American Red Cross for the sale of these stamps in Pennsylvania, and a record sale is predicted.
