# VANISHED DENIZEN OF DEEP RETURNS TO TEMPT EPICURE

Tile Fish, Beautiful, Palatable and Cheap in Cost, Again Sports in Countless Numbers Off Jersey Coast

ROMANCE OF SEA LIFE

This is that rara avis, a true fish story It concerns the introduction to Philadelphis housewives of the tile fish, to this market an entirely new food fish of teethsome quality, comparable to halibut in firmness of flesh and taste, which, when first put on sale in Philadelphia tosorrow, will materially reduce the cost of living, since it can be sold at a less rate per pound than hallbut because it is found in very large quantities within it miles from the New Jersey coast.

Philadelphia will be the natural market for the distribution and handling of this new sea food for a large territory.


The tile fish runs from 10 to 50 pounds The file and runs from 10 of pounds in weight. It is as beautiful to look upon as a speckled brook trout, and is perhaps the most tropically colored large fish caught in Northern waters. Its dorsal fins are of a delicate transparent cream and rose color, the back a soft bluish and rose color, the back a soft bluish gray graduating to white as it approaches the lower part of the body, the whole covered with yellow and rosy spots. The ead is a delicate yellowish red.

The only specimen now in Philadelphia weighs 44 pounds, and measures four feet are inches in length. Hanging in front of the establishment of M. P. ## COSTS ARE EXPLAINED AT ELECTRIC HEARING

Figures Produced to Show Worth of Manholes, Nuts, Screws and Conduits

A long flow of figures covering the cost of manholes, nuts, screws and the cost per foot of conduits was patiently heard at today's session of the hearing before the Public Service Commission of Director Cooke's complaint against the Philadelphia Electric Company, which he asserts has overcharged the city.

Jackson, of the Massachusetts School of Technology, occupied the stand, and brought on the array of figures under cross-examination by William Draper Lewis, chief counsel of Director Cooke. He asserted that there were 350 classes of labor used by the

company, and endeavored to explain the work performed by these classes.

At the suggestion of William D. B. Ainey, chairman of the commission, it was agreed that Mr. Lewis should submit questions to Professor Jackson in advance in order to expedite matters.

## ST. LOUIS LEADS RACE FOR THE CONVENTION

Democratic National Committee Meets Tomorrow and Will Select the City

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6. - St. Louis forged to the front today in the race for the honor of entertaining the next Democratic National Convention. With practically the entire membership of the National Committee on hand for to-National Committee on hand for to-morrow's meeting, the Mound City aggre-gation declared they already had more than a majority of the committee pledged for that city as the place where the con-vention will assemble next June.

Although this claim was denied by advocates of the other contesting cities, there was little doubt that the first vote will find St. Louis leading, with Chicago, Dallas and San Francisco following in the order natured. It is not expected that the choice of

the convention city will be made until tomorrow's session, as the majority of members will be guests of Congress at noon to hear President Wilson read his

annual message, In addition to the selection of the time and place for the convention, the com-mittee will adopt resolutions indorsing

the Administration and will elect a new treasurer and secretary.

There will be no fight on Chairman McCombs, who will remain undisturbed until the new committee is named, fel-lowing the adjournment of the next Na-

tional Convention.

Two contests will be decided, from Kentucky, where General W. B. Haldaman is contesting the seat now held by Urey Woodson, and Oregon, where W. H. Woodson, and Oregon, where W. Easterly wants the seat of Will King. The entire National Committee will be entertained by President Wilson at lunch-con at the White House at 1 o'clock Wed-
