DR. WILLIAM J. ROE MARTYR TO SCIENCE

Injury Received While Performing Operation Caused His Death

Dr. William J. Roe, who died a week ago, was a martyr to his profession, according to information received here by his friends today. Dr. Roe, who was considered one of the best surgeons in the laited States, was the head of the delatinent of oral surgery at the Philametrian General Hospital and a staff surgeon at the Jefferson Hospital. He lived at the Jefferson Hospital. He lived at the direct cause of his death, accord-

ing to his friends, was toxemia, that foling to his friends, was toxemia, that followed an operation on a tobercular kiddey. Three years ago, Dr. Roe was operating on a cancer patient, who was at the point of death in the Jefferson Hospital. He requested a nurse to hand him a certain knife to remove dead tissues of the patient. The nurse pushed the knife point into the surgeon's hand and pierced the little finger of the right hand above the first joint.

He hastily disinfected the wound and continued the operation. Shortly thereafter he noticed that the finger had swollen, and finally the swelling apread to his hand and arm. Blood poisoning had set in; the hand was opened, and a draining, tube freetted in his arm. Aldrainage tube inserted in his arm. Al-drainage tube inserted in his arm. Al-though suffering great pain, Dr. Roe stuck to his duties and several weeks after the addent performed a difficult operation.

Finally, seeking relief, he consulted Dr. William J. Mayo, of Rochester, Minn., who saw the infection had apread to the kidneys, and he ordered an operation. It was performed, but had little effect. Four days later Dr. Roe died.
