U. OF P. STUDENT PROM PERSIA FEARS RUIN OF HIS COUNTRY

Hassam Musa Believes Foreign Domination Threatens Ancient Land With Belgium's Fate

Hassam Musa, a student in the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, said today that the neutrality of his native country, Persia, has been repeatedly violated by three of the warring nations, and it is because Persia she has remained while Turkish and Russian troops have crossed her northern terri-tory, fought battles upon her soil, devastated her resources and occupied her cities. England, too, has taken possion of certain additional territory the south of Persia since the war began, Mr. Musa said today, and, in his opinion, the only reasons Germany, France and the only reasons Germany, France and Italy and Austria have not invaded Per-

sia is because her territory has not been accessible to their troops from any point of strategical advantage.

Mr. Musa, who is in his fourth year as a student in the University of Pennsylvania, where he is taking a course in collidar. political history and economy, is the son of the Governor General of a Persian province and one of the many young Persians who, for the last 15 years, have been sent to universities in Europe and United States, that they might return home imbued with western ideas in art, science and professional and business pursuits, with which, through schools and colleges, they might instruct their

PERSIA A BONE OF CONTENTION. Speaking today of the situation in his native land, Mr. Musa said: "As most people know, Persia has been the butt of a long-existing conflict between Rusof a long-existing conflict between Russia and England, each seeking supremacy over the other, and it was only in 1912 that my country became a party to the Anglo-Russian convention of August 31, 1987, by which each of the two contending powers agreed to confine its political and commercial operations to definite regions not overlapping, and Persia agreed to respect conditions of forced occupa-

confined to the north, where the Caspian Sea and the Russian Empire form our coundary, and English interests to the south, touching upon Indian territory.
"One of the articles of this Anglo-Russian convention was to the effect that it guaranteed the independence of Persia for all time, and delivered the country from fear of any foreign intervention by other nations. History shows whether or not the first clause of this article has been respected in which connection, it is significantly pertinent to touch upon the difficulties that involved the administration of W. Morgan Shuster as financial adviser to Persia, and made him, in his controversies with Russian and England in 1911, a conspicuous figure in international politics. guaranteed the independence of Persia tional politics

combine, upon our return home, these ideas with the knowledge we have of the temperaments of our countrymen. "We are very fearful this condition will be much retarded, no matter who wins the present war, and we look with con-cern at the increased invasion of our country since it began.

DEVASTATED BY TURKS.

Turkey has sent an army through our Turkey has sent an army through our northern territory and devastated it. The Turks occupied the city of Tabriz and fought several battles with Russian troops, driving them into Russia. Then the Russians returned, strongly reinforced, and defeating the Turks, drove them back to their own boundary line. Now the Turks have returned, and the result is that the entire north of my country is in the hands of rival invaders, who, through the right of might, remain and absorb the resources of the north, let alone pursuing a policy of dictation and domination. We are powerless to prevent this, and even if we were strong, could not expect to cope with these powerful na-tions to a successful end. We fear very much that if we made any determined resistance according to our ability, our country would be wiped out and be reduced to the lot of unhappy Belgium. Trulyl the lot of Persia, from present indications, is a most unhappy one."
