

NANCY WYNNE SEES SHORT RESPIRE IN THE MANY CHARITY AFFAIRS

Yuletide Doings Will Call a Halt on the Numerous Philanthropic Affairs, but Society Will Give Largely at Christmas Time

WITH the long-heralded Ritz bazaar over, and its promoters now taking account of their rich returns, Society will turn to the poor nearer home and plan for their happiness at Christmas, having arranged for a few weeks the war sufferers, the Japanese International Hospital in Tokio and a few other things, among them Mrs. Tower's separate German Aid Association.

So many of our young people do such kind things which are never heard of. Only very recently I heard of a girl, who is only 19 and one of the greatest belles, who goes everywhere and is in everything going, but nevertheless finds time to call twice a week on a sad little family she has heard of, and made it her business to investigate, where the mother died recently. The father is crippled with rheumatism, and even the cooking revolves upon a small boy of 10 years, who dresses his little brothers and sisters, gets the meals and tries to clean the house, and actually manages to attend school there and actually cleans the mite of a living room herself. She knows they do not want a regular social visitor, and they do not mind her. And, as the man said to me, when I stopped in one day recently, "Whatever would we do without her?"

The bazaar at the Ritz yesterday afternoon attracted the most representative group of fashionables seen for some time, and old and young found the wares purchasable. The most unique feature of the afternoon was the juvenile fashion parade, held in the rotunda adjoining the ballroom, at 4 o'clock. The tiniest excited totties appeared, all togged out in the very latest made for the benefit of their admiring elders. Their turn consisted in marching boldly up to a curtain, on which hung the picture of a crying baby, and trying to place a bottle in its mouth. Little Virginia Brock and her sturdy "big" brother, Sidney, the adorable children of Mrs. Sidney P. Tyler Brock, caused a ripple of amusement when they posed for a photograph. Virginia's treble voice was heard to exclaim, "He won't let me hold his hand," whereupon Master Sidney was properly rebuked and the picture snapped—indeed, the little girl was so entertained by the whole proceeding that she wanted the flash to "do it over again."

The children were quite the most fascinating things imaginable. Among the other future belles and beaux who appeared as mannikins were little Josephine Fraley, the daughter of Mrs. Fred Fraley; Anita Foulke, Mrs. Foulke's small daughter; Mrs. Charles Curtis Harrison, Jr.'s daughter, Mary Spottiswoode Harrison, the good-looking Grace Jordan's little girl, Mary Fell Jordan, and young Stacy B.
