### FIFTY-TWO WORDS BIND ALLIES NOT TO MAKE SEPARATE PEACE

LONDON, Dec. 23.—Fifty-two words comprise the most powerful international pact in the history of the world. This pact is the Declaration of London, binding England, France, Russia, Japan and Italy into a quintuple alliance. By the terms of the pact not one of the powers can conclude a separate peace.

The text of the covenant follows: The British, French, Italian, Japanese and Russian Governments mutually agree not to conclude peace separately during the present war. The five Governments agree that when terms of peace come to be discussed no one of the Allies will demand conditions of peace without the previous agreement of each of the

It is signed by the following representatives of the powers: England, Sir Edward Grey: France, Paul Cambon; Italy, Marquis Imperiali; Japan, K. Inouye; Russia, Comte Benckendorff.
