SENATOR LEWIS Foreigners who have obtained their citizenship here and prospered would never have dared to criticize our laws and institutions had they not felt at liberty to do so because of the liberty we granted them.

There should be added to these the further laws, enforcing upon all who have enjoyed the benefits of naturalization the duty to comply with the laws of their adopted country, and prescribing that any citizen whose conduct is such as to be unworthy of citizenship should have the citizenship withdrawn by the courts.

FREDERIC COUDERT The Monroe Doctrine is our policy and at the time ever comes to test it it will turn into a living policy.

When the vital moment comes the Monroe Doctrine will be recognized as a vital force. Foreign nations may believe it can be violated, but if so it will be necessary for us to undeceive them.

Senator Lewis urged that the right to vote be made a duty and that suffrage be taken from men who did not show by the exercise of their franchise that they were citizens of the United States.

DR. GARBER FROWNS ON CHRISTMAS GIFTS TO TEACHERS IN SCHOOLS

Superintendent Discourages Custom of Giving Presents to Instructors by Pupils—Says Poor Children, Always Most Anxious to Give, Cannot Afford Expense

THE practice of presenting Christmas gifts to teachers, common among the school children of Philadelphia for a half century, will be discouraged by the year by the educational authorities.
