G. ALBERT LEWIS

Prominent in Finance and Noted as an Artist and Historian

Albert Lewis, 85 years old, one of Philadelphia's most remarkable charac-ters because of his versatility, died yes-terday at his home, 1834 De Lancey street. He was a painter and financier and historian.

Albert Lewis was born July 3, 1829, and received his early education at the Friends' Academy. He was the son of John F. Lewis, an old-time Philadelphia

merchant.
Albert was the seventh son, and after leaving school he entered the counting house of his brother, Edwin M. Lewis & Co., and in 1850 became a member of the firm of John A. Lewis & Co., and after its dissolution became assistant to the president and cashler of the Farmers and Mechanics National Bank in 1857. Mr. Lewis was elected cashler of the City National Bank in 1983, a position he held for 37 years, resigning in 1990. He was an artist of considerable abil-

ity, exhibiting for a number of seasons paintings in oil and in water color at the exhibitions of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and at those held by the Artists' Fund Society of Philadelphia. He devoted much time to the study of genealogy, in which he be-came exceedingly skilful. He was a member of the Historical Society of Penn-sylvania, the Numismatic and Antiquar-ian Society and the American Philosoph-

ical Society.

He married, in 1851, Anne Cornella, the daughter of the Rev. Thomas Larcombe. She died in 1898. Two children survive, one the wife of the Rev. Frederick Baylies Allen, of Boston, Mass., and the other Hermann A. Lewis, of Philadelphin.
