Miss Catherine Denny, Secretary to Director Datesman, Knows, but Shuns Politics. Believes in Suffrage

IS "WOMAN FOR THE JOB"

The keynote of efficiency that seems to have been struck in the appointment of the men who form the personnel of the Department of Public Works under the new administration extends also to its women assistants, and especially to Miss Catherine Denney, who will not in the capacity of confidential stenographer to the new Director, George E. Datesman. Miss Denney has been Mr. Datesman's right-hand assistant in the Bureau of Surveys for-to quote her own words-"years and years, and so ot."

Living up to her own ideal of the quali-ties that go to make up the most effi-cient and desirable confidential stenog-rapher, namely, making one's self an ab-solutely dependable person, has resulted in her chief's retention of her as a clear most in the denariment. asset to the department.

Yesterday found her striving to get her bearings in the new office at a strange desk among new associates. Every con-scientious effort at work, however, was punctuated by the hearty handshakes of her friends and former co-workers, who dropped in to extend their congratulations for her new appointment.
