CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—The Progressive arty, through its National Committee in ession here, openly invites amalgamation till the Republicans in order to defeat

In a straightforward statement of prin-siples, voiced by George W. Perkins, chairman, the way is opened for the party merger. The declaration fixes June as the date of the Progressive National Convention, the sme as that fixed by the Republicans, and also in Chicago.

It declares for a reunion of the party strength and the return of the Progressives to the Republican fold.

The efficial statement bears the signatures of national committeemen at the chicago conference, and it is understood leago conference, and it is understood embody exactly the views entertained Colonel Roosevelt

That the Progressives, too, will not mist on the nomination of Colonel toosevelt by the Republicans as the rice of amaignmation was the specific atement of George W. Perkins, who was nderstood to speak for Roosevelt.

"We are all hoping," said Mr. Perkins, lith deliberation, "that both parties will sree on somebody, and it need not necesarily be Mr. Roosevelt."


