DAVE FULTZ' WARNING TO PLAYERS LIKELY TO STIR UP TROUBLE IN BASEBALL

Magnates Resent Statement Issued by President of Players' Fraternity—Split Between Members and Magnates May Result

The Baseball Players' Fraternity, through its ambitious president, Dave Fultz, star outfielder of Connie Mack's first pennant-winning team in 1902, is going to play an important part in the final peace settlement...

All Federal League players are requested to seek legal advice, preferably that of Fultz, before signing new contracts with teams of Organized Ball.

Other magnates express similar views and all declare that it will be time enough for the Players' Fraternity and President Fultz to take up cudgels when the contracts in force had not been honored by organized ball and not before.

It was generally believed that players would be completely squashed after peace had been made between the warring forces, but as long as Fultz can keep the players together and the fraternity in good shape the players will have far more to say than the magnates will like.

One hundred swimmers, the pick of the New England and Middle Atlantic schools will contest for the interscholastic swimming title Saturday afternoon in the University of Pennsylvania pool, Weightman Hall.

The schools that have entered teams are Lawrenceville, Brooklyn Poly, New York Manual, Mercersburg Academy, Boston English High, St. Luke's, Haverford Prep, Central High, Lansdowne High and West Philadelphia High, last year's champions.

schools are some of the best schoolboy swimmers in the country. The events start at 2 o'clock. Lawrenceville, always a favorite, is said to be in excellent shape to go after the title won from them by the West Philadelphia team last year.

Coach Lory Prentiss, of the Lawrenceville swimmers, had several of his proteges at work in the University of Pennsylvania tank yesterday, but the time trials were not made public.

Last year the West Philadelphia High team captured the interscholastic title, and indications point to another W. P. H. S. victory this year.

Lansdowne High will be represented by Uhl, its only entry. Uhl is one of the fastest schoolboys in this section of the State and is a favorite in the sprint.

The West Philadelphians, who have been practicing for the meet in the West Branch Y. M. C. A. pool since the close of the football season, transferred their training quarters to the Weightman Hall pool this week.

Hobart Kistler, son of the Penn coach, is captain of West Philadelphia High. The final tryouts for Saturday's meet, recently conducted by Coach Anthony, resulted in all the veterans winning places on the team to represent West Philly.
