Junior Auxiliary of St. Francis' Home for Convalescents Will Give "You Don't Say" at Bellevue-Stratford on February 4

AS SOON as we recover from one amateur performance it seems we are on with another. Now it is a musical comedy in two acts, entitled "You Don't Say," which opens on the balcony for Friday night, February 4, to the Junior Auxiliary of St. Francis' Home for Convalescents out in Lansdowne, which was started some three years ago and which has done such remarkably good work.

There are a number of women in town who visit the Philadelphia Hospital every week, and this work done by members of the Children of Mary attached to the Convent of the Sacred Heart, has been going on for more than 40 years. It had long been apparent to them that there was great need of a home in the country to which patients who were dismissed from the hospital could go for a week or two to build up their strength. So often they go right back to their work before they are able and are so placed that they cannot go away to rest.

Finally, these good ladies, ably assisted by the chaplains and other visiting associations of the hospital, were able to raise sufficient funds to start the convalescent home, which is kept up entirely on charity, and great good has been done.

A Junior auxiliary was formed, with Frances Sullivan at the head as president, and every year this energetic auxiliary gets up an entertainment and charity help on the good work, which is purely nonsectarian.

"You Don't Say" is written specially for the occasion by William Mason Wright, Jr., whose work with the Mask and Wig Club has attracted considerable notice. There will be 127 young people in the cast, and it will be great, I feel sure.

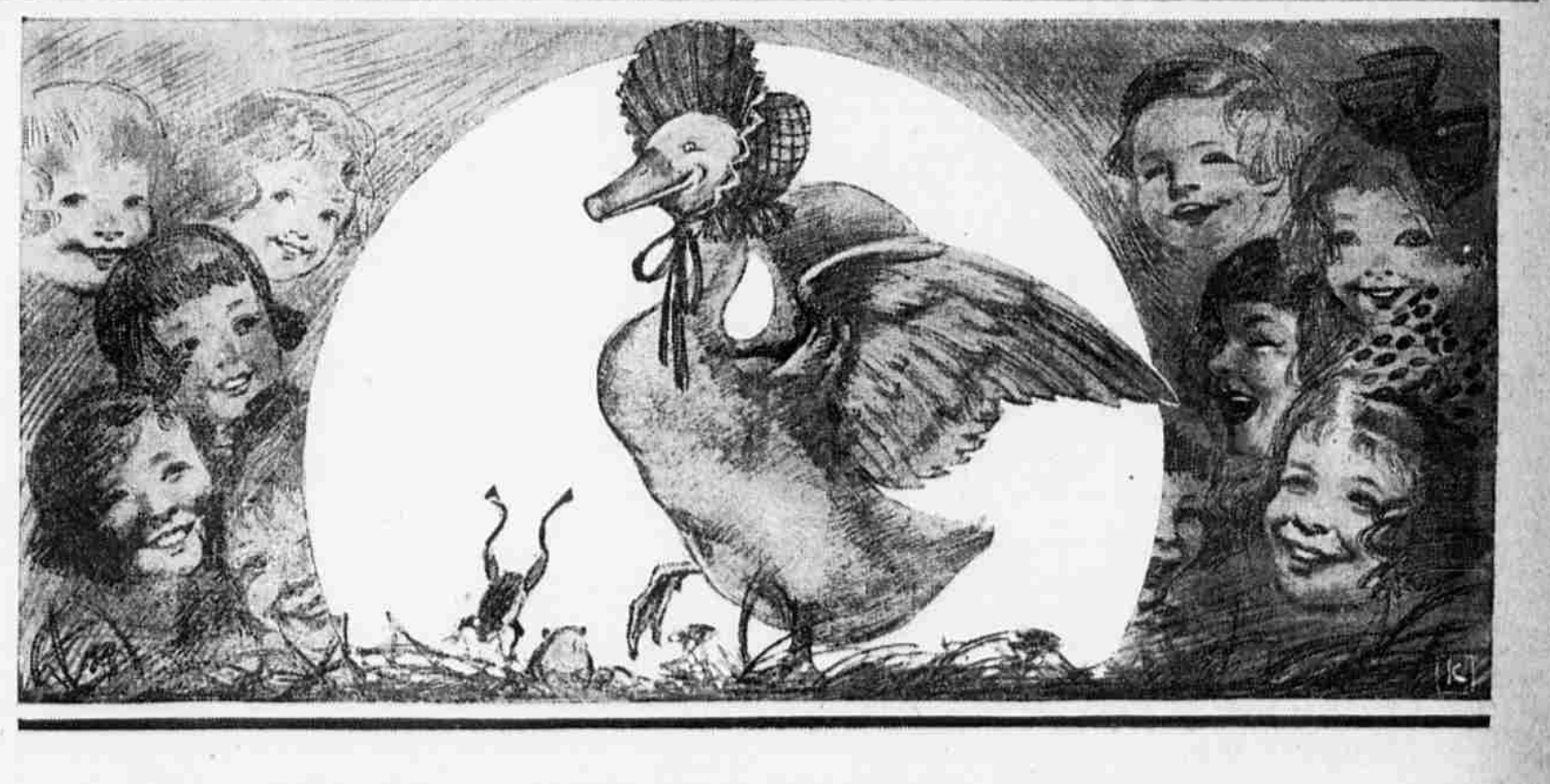
