SURPRISE MAY BE SPRUNG WHEN COMMITTEE SELECTS ASSISTANTS TO BOB FOLWELL

Pauxtis, 'Dark Horse,' Will Probably Be Named as Coach of Ends—Dickson Logical Choice as Graduate Manager

WHEN the Pennsylvania Football Committee announces the names of Bob Folwell's assistants for next season's gridiron campaign several surprises are likely to be sprung.

Harold Gaston will be retained to coach the scrub eleven, according to a report going the rounds in Penn football circles.

If Wharton is not able to join the squad at the start of the season Folwell will handle the line himself, with one assistant to look after the ends and another to take care of the backs, particularly the quarterback position.

Pauxtis May Be Selected Coach of Ends

"SI" Pauxtis, one of Penn's greatest ends, and who coached the ends during George Brooke's first season as coach, will probably be the man selected to handle the ends.

Folwell is known to have had two distinct favorites for the backfield assistant, but there is little chance for Penn to secure either.

Dickson Likely Choice as Graduate Manager

Dickson is in the field for the position of graduate manager of athletics, and is said to be almost certain of the appointment.

The undergraduates and the majority of Penn athletes of the last 15 years are strong for Dickson. They believe him to be the ideal man for the position.

Golf Association Has Trouble Ahead

The passing of a rule by the Executive Committee of the United States Golf Association, which automatically makes all men professionals who sell golf goods, either as a proprietor or employee of a concern, provided such persons depend on their fame or skill as a golfer to promote these sales.

There is no way to prove that a man is depending on his golfing fame to promote sales, and there is also nothing to prevent a golfer from owning and operating a sporting goods store in the name of another.

Quimet Will Also Be Lost to Amateur Ranks

The situation in the golf world on the amateur question is similar to that in the tennis realm. Apparently there is little need for a great change in the amateur code of either association.
