The most important feature of the socialistic peace movement is that Socialists of England France and Italy are in touch with Austro-Hungarian and German Socialists and are striving for a common ground on which to work.

The next move in the socialistic campaign is to try to influence the respective belligerent Governments toward peace in the following directions:

First. Limitation of armament.

Second. Reformation of diplomacy in order to eliminate secret treaties.

Third. Extension of parliamentary control over governmental acts, to that the people will know just what their Governments are doing.

Fourth. Compulsory arbitration of all international disputes.

European reformers are hoping for the establishment of a great international socialistic union at the conclusion of the war which will have powers of such widespread extent as to prevent another such configaration in the future.
