## 177 COLLEGES ARE INVITED TO PENN RELAYS

More Teams Than Ever Before Expected at This Year's Carnival

Invitations to the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival, to be held the last Friday and Saturday. April the 2sthand 2sth, have been sent to colleges throughout the United States, and it be expected that more than 300 teams—the number that year -will accept, making the 1910 meet the fargest and most important track event ever held in America. In all, 122 invitations have been mailed to various, colleges, the number being greater by 87 than the college teams which ran in the Franklin Field event last year,

It is almost certain that another recordbreaking set of games will be seen. The Red and Blue management has already received word from colleges from over all the country that teams will be sent, all the country that teams will be sent, thus assuring national concessnation. Several colleges have given definite word that their best athletes will exhibit in the pentathlon. Howard Berry, last year's winner, will be entered again this year, together with Withington, of Dartmouth, who finished second. A new entrant is Paul Devereux, the Muhlenberg freshman, who, at Tome Institute, won the scholastic pentathlon champlonship of the South last year.

That the nicet will approach the standard of last year is brought out by the fact that nearly every star performer of record-breaking teams will again be on hand. If will be remembered that last year Pennsylvania's one-mile relay team made a new world's record of 3 minutes is seconds. Princeton's two-mile team made a new college record of 7 minutes 55-3-5 seconds. A new record was made in the aprint and distance medley, made in the aprint and distance medley, by Pennsylvania and Yale, respectively. Richards, of Cornell, won the high jump, clearing 6 feet 5 inches. Poss, of Cornell, and Newsetter, of Pennsylvania, cleared 12 feet 10 inches in the pole vault, the greatest performance of the year in this event. Phillips, of Idaho University, made a new record in the javelin, while Ferguson, of Pennsylvania, created new figures in the 40-yard hurdles.
