NEW MUSIC SCHOOL IS CALLED 'THE FUTURE HOPE OF REPUBLIC'

Ex-Governor Stuart Lays Cornerstone of Building in Memory of Mrs. Louise Knapp

The movement to "Americanize through music" took concrete form when former Governor Stuart laid the cornerstone of the new Settlement Music School, at 416-428 Chestnut street, in the presence of hundreds of prominent men and women and an enthusiastic throng of American children of foreign descent, yesterday afternoon.

Simple ceremonies marked the dedication of the building, now under course of construction as a memorial to Mrs. Louise Knapp Curtis, mother of Mrs. Edward Bok, one of the vice presidents of the school. The building is to cost \$150,000 when completed, and will provide commodious quarters for the school, which now numbers 200 pupils, and is conducted at 427 Chestnut street.

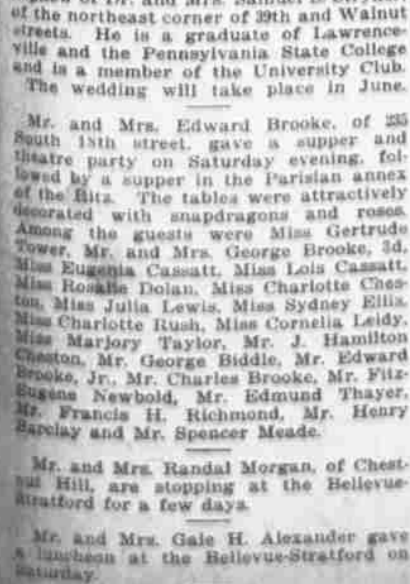
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
