Under the guidance of National Com-mitteeman A. Mitchell Palmer several conferences were held this week at the Bellevue-Stratford, Prominent upstate as well as local Democrats were in attend-

Microscopic search falled to reveal a single available candidate for the United States Senate, while the "harmony" talk fell on deaf ears.

The impression prevails that an entirely new deal must be wrought out before party activity in this State can be revived. Many look upon the present situation as the passing of the "Big Four"—Palmer, McCormick, Blakslee and Morris—who have dictated the "reorganizers" program for the last three years.

Among those talked of for the Senate, Secretary of Labor William B. Wilson and Edward S. Lynett, of Scraaton, both flatly declined, while the friends or the scholarly Henry Budd, of this city, declared it would be an insult to ask him to make the vicarious sacrifice again.

Roland S. Morris, State chalrman, when Roland S Morris, State chairman, when questioned at his office in the Land Title Building, after the conferences, expressed wild regret that no one seemed "anxious" to serve the party at this juncture, but thought a fit candidate would be secured "atter a little." This view was not echoed by others consulted, who appeared to agree that a proffer of support from the present party lenders in the State would present party leaders in the State would be looked upon as more or less of a joke.

Neither Vance McCormick, of Harris-burg, nor Assistant Postmaster General James S. Blakeslee, the other members of the "Big Four." had any part in the re-cent conferences.

The opinion was general that the "Big

Four" had about reached the end of their Federal patronage and could not proceed much farther in the process of "reorganizing" the party out of existence so far as State and local issues were concerned.
