# SCHELLING SOLOIST WITH BOSTON BAND

Pianist Plays His Own Variations With Dr. Muck's Orchestra

A symphony heard here but two weeks A symphony heard here but two weeks ago, three symphonic sketches by Debussy not heard for some time, and a series of variations never heard here before, made up the program which the magnificent band from Beacon Hill (or, more accurately, from Symphony Hall), played here last night, For the third and newest of these three numbers the composer Ernest Schelling was present as

newest of these three numbers the com-poser, Ernest Schelling, was present as assisting artist.

The symphony was Mozart's in E flat, which Mr. Stokowski conducted at the concerts of February 4-5. There was something temperatuous in the first al-legro, as Doctor Muck conducted it, and he raced with rare zest through the two final movements—with good authority, for Mozart himself was not averse to final movements—with good authority, for Mozart himself was not averse to going through certain of his works "on high." The whole was admirably, deftly, intelligently played. It made one think, for all the new not only accorted but revered and bulwarked simplicity of it, that Mozart would have liked the three "sea" sketches of Debussy which itood on the same program. For it his time Mozart outraged quiet minds by his daring, and, no doubt, by his delicacy of humor. That is a quality which inheres in Debussy's sketches, as much as it does in those lberian thumb-nail bits which are not often enough played by orches-

composer and in the soul of the sea, if we remember the sea in all the variety that sweeps across the monotony of its denths. Debussy has caught tempers of the water, has suggested even the nerves of the sea, and one may only quarrel with him if the sea he has so tremulously captured be not the sea of one's own experience or inastination. Even then something will be left in praise of the beauty of the themes and the maryely of orchestration. None of which were scanted in the playing last

Mr. Schelling's work was a series of "Impressions (from an artist's life) in form of variations on an original theme for orchestra and planuforte!" The whole is dedicated to the composer's wife, the is dedicated to the composer's wife, the theme to the orchestra, which played it last night, the first variation to the same, the second, a canon, rather martial, to the conductor, Dr. Karl Muck. Memorial dedications are those to Hans Pfitzner and to Gustave Mahler. The choe solo is to G. Longy, a variation for strings alone. "Polsia" to Paderewski, one for viola and piana has the initials of Pritz Kreisfer, prother for full probests, recalls the comparties has the initials of Fritz Architer, another for full orchestrs, recalls the com-poser's association with the Buke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin. The variation, "August, 1914," with the suggestion of troops going to war without the glamor of battle had an immediate and special

So likeable, so varied and so interesting were all of these, and the other variation to the total number of 19, that one was

prone to overlook the truly remarkable playing of Mr Schelling himself. His vir-tucalty has long been unquestioned; his sympathetic interpretation of his own work might have been taken for granted. work might have been taken for granted. Yet, assuming everything, there was an added grandness of execution in Mr. Schelling, a thrilling and wonderful communication from the piano to the auditors. Of the separate variations that with the initials of Doctor Muck was certainly the least subtle, though it was full of a charm and humor which certainly are characteristic of the great conductor. The characteristic of the great conductor. The dedicated offerings to both Paderewski and Kreisler are to the private man less than to the public, to the artist in each rather than to the player. Mr. Paderewski was, in the quaint and rustle phrase, an Interested appliander at the performance. The turbulent spirit of Mahler was admirably suggested and the marvelous playing of Mr. Longy not only suggested but put toffts severest test.

Apart from these personal interests, the whole work is become constant and

whole work is largely conceived and or-chestrated with a tremendous freedom. Mr. Schelling has the soul of a musician and adds to that the verve of the amateur (in more senses than one) when he begins to compose for the orchestra. So there is something generous and cheering and free in his work. It is too early to prophesy that no other pianls; will care to learn these variations. It would be a pity if the intense personal nature of some of them would keep the series out of the repertoire of other orchestras than this. For the work is big enough and fine enough to go of its own.
