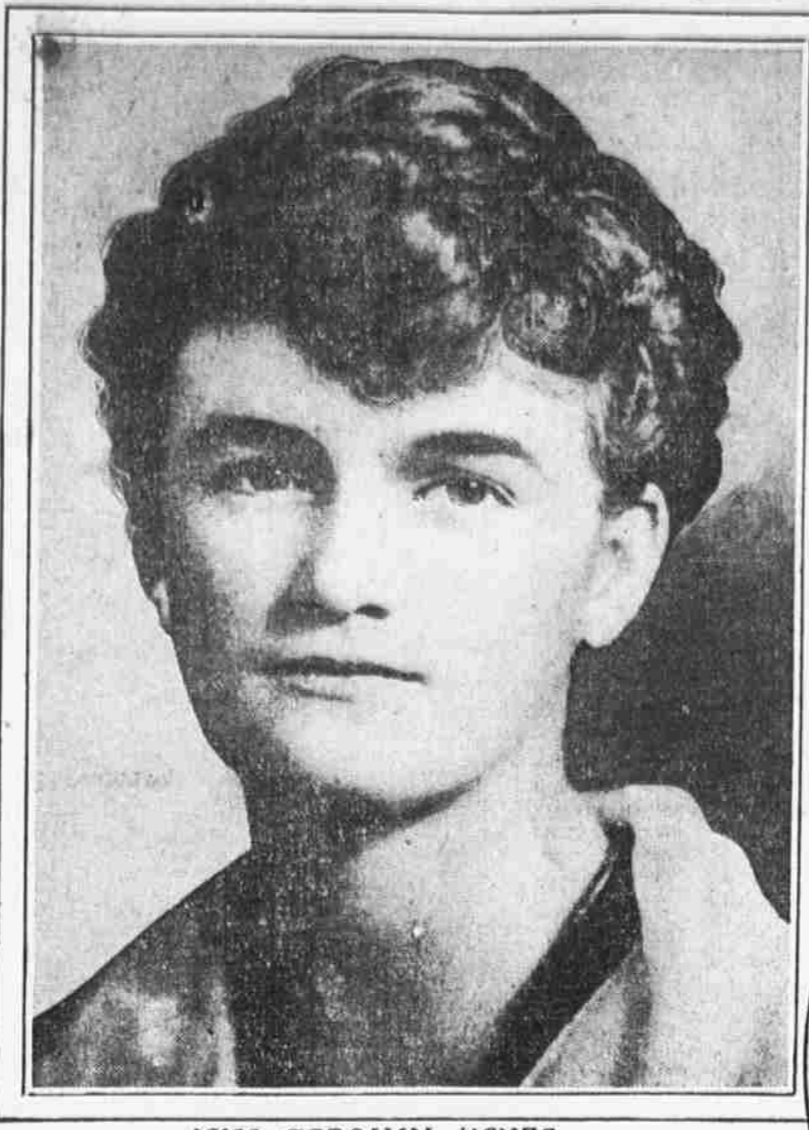

Following the ceremony, which took place at St. George's Hanover Square, there was a reception at Claridge's. The bride is a daughter of the late Henry DePew, of New York, and the groom, who is 60 years old, is a member of a Norwegian family which is extremely wealthy and dates back to the twelfth century.
