armories are not only far too small. But since spiked shoes are not permitted, every competitor risks serious injury. The present Convention Hall cannot be

properly heated and is likewise too inac-It is hoped to have the new municipal

auditorium so constructed that it will be possible to lay a good-sized track on which the men can use spiked shoes and which will have seating accommodations for from 10,000 to 15,000 spectators. With

such accommodations this city should be able to conduct indoor meets more suc-cessfully and under better conditions than any other city in America.

As soon as the proper conditions are

assured application should be made for the annual indoor meet of the Intercol-legiate Association of Amateur Athletes

of America, held the first Saturday in March and now going to New York an-nually because no other city can offer the

proper accommodations. That would bring to this city also the annual convention of the I. C. A. A. A. A., which has been meeting in New York almost from time immemorial.

Those who want to see Philadelphia properly advertised should realize that this big meet and convention are worth working for. First of all, there should

be some co-operation between the University of Pennsylvania Athletic Association and the A. A. U. officials for the purpose of seeing that when the plans for

this auditorium are completed nothing be left undone to make it suitable for conducting the greatest indoor meets in

Just now Philadelphia has the reputa-

tion of being a poor city for indoor games, but the reasons for it are those given above. It is possible to overcome all these objections at one blow. Phila-

delphia now conducts the greatest and most popular outdoor athletic carnival in America in the University of Pennsylva-nia's two-day relay carnival, which was witnessed last year by 20,000 spectators.


