WILLIAM PENN GIRLS SHUN SCHOOL COURT

That Is Why Conduct of Students Is Superb and No One Chews Gum

As time goes on it becomes more eviden that no one of the 1600 girls who are students at the William Penn High School, 15th and Mt. Vernon streets, will ever be tried by a judge and jury. No graduate of the school has ever faced anything more serious than an art jury, and the great majority not even that. The undergraduates are going the same innocent

Yet there is a judge and jury ever ready to convict any student. The judge is a girl student and the jury is composed of girl students. The first prisoner who appears will be convicted; there is no question about that; they have been waiting too long for an offender to let the longwished-for trial develop into the flasco of an acquittal. Guilty or not guilty, the verdict will be guilty. This business of walting for a prisoner gets on one's nerves after a while, they say.

The institution of a student court has been in effect at the school for four weeks. It is in the nature of an honor system, the court being really a grant of student self-government. But all the fun of the idea of judging and condemning one's fellow-girls went out of the scheme when it was found no one would consent to be had enough to be brought before the court. The latter is composed of six girls. A wave of superb conduct has swept over the school with the inauguration of the court. No one has even chewed gum,
