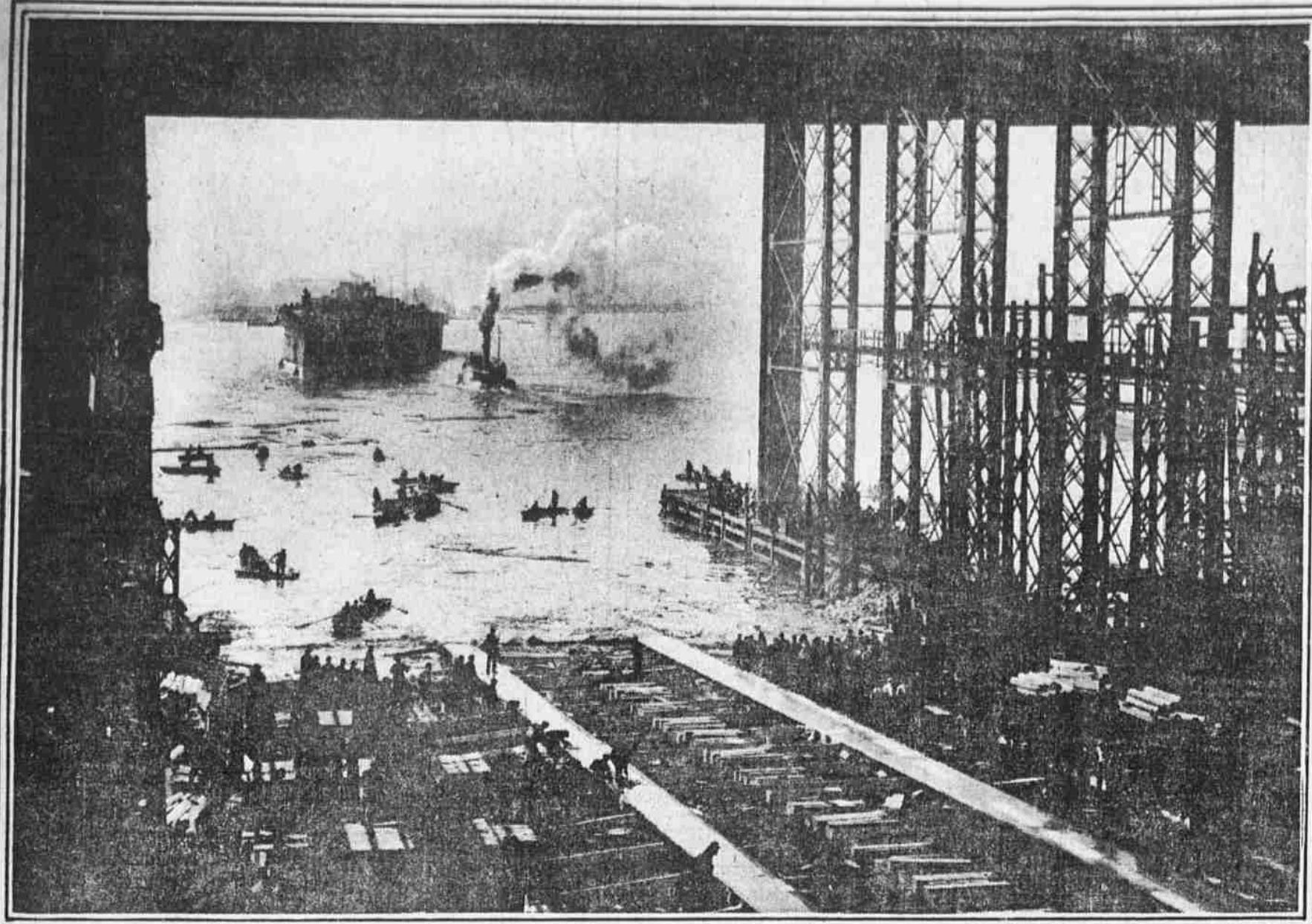

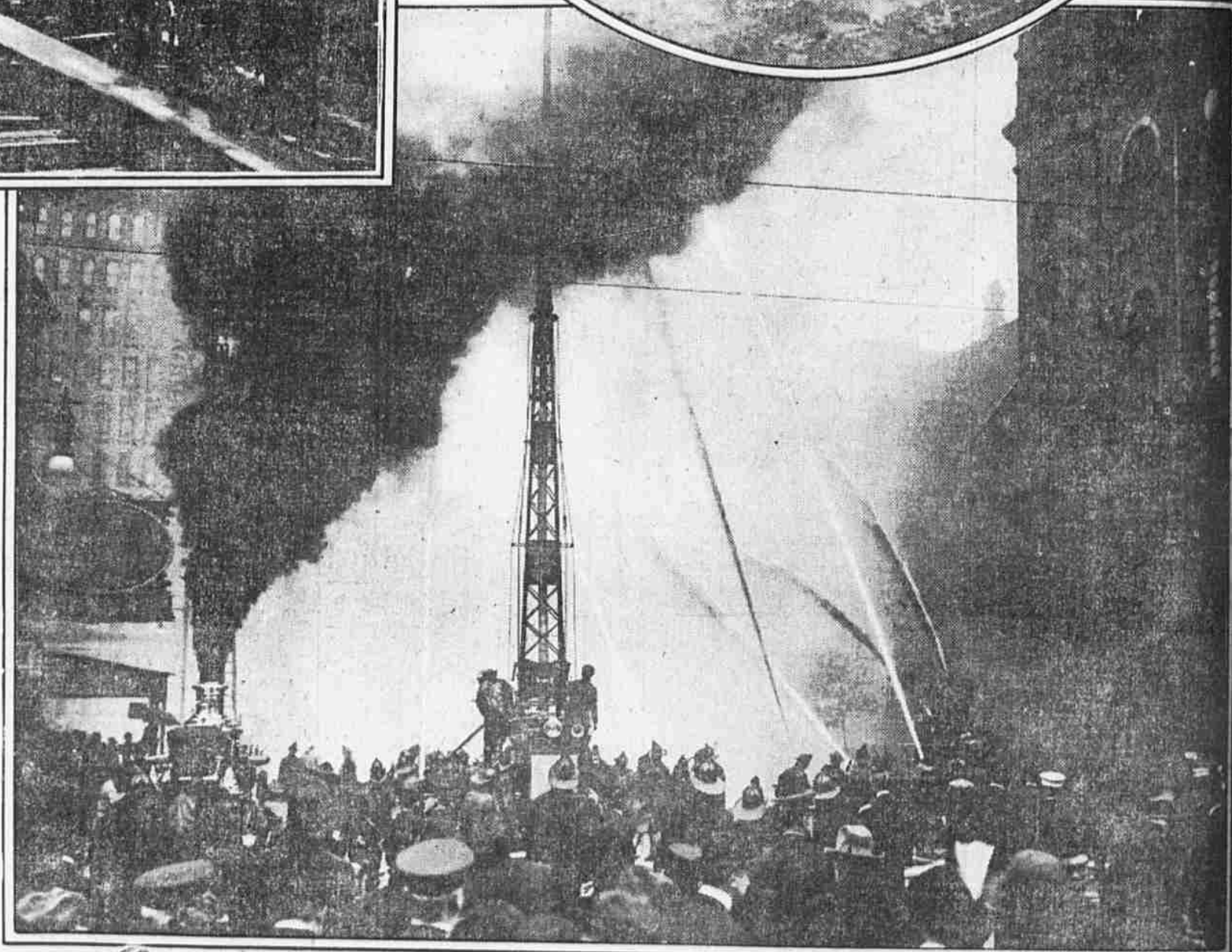
NOTES AND COMMENT ON THE NEWS OF THE DAY AS GRAPHICALLY TOLD BY THE CAMER
