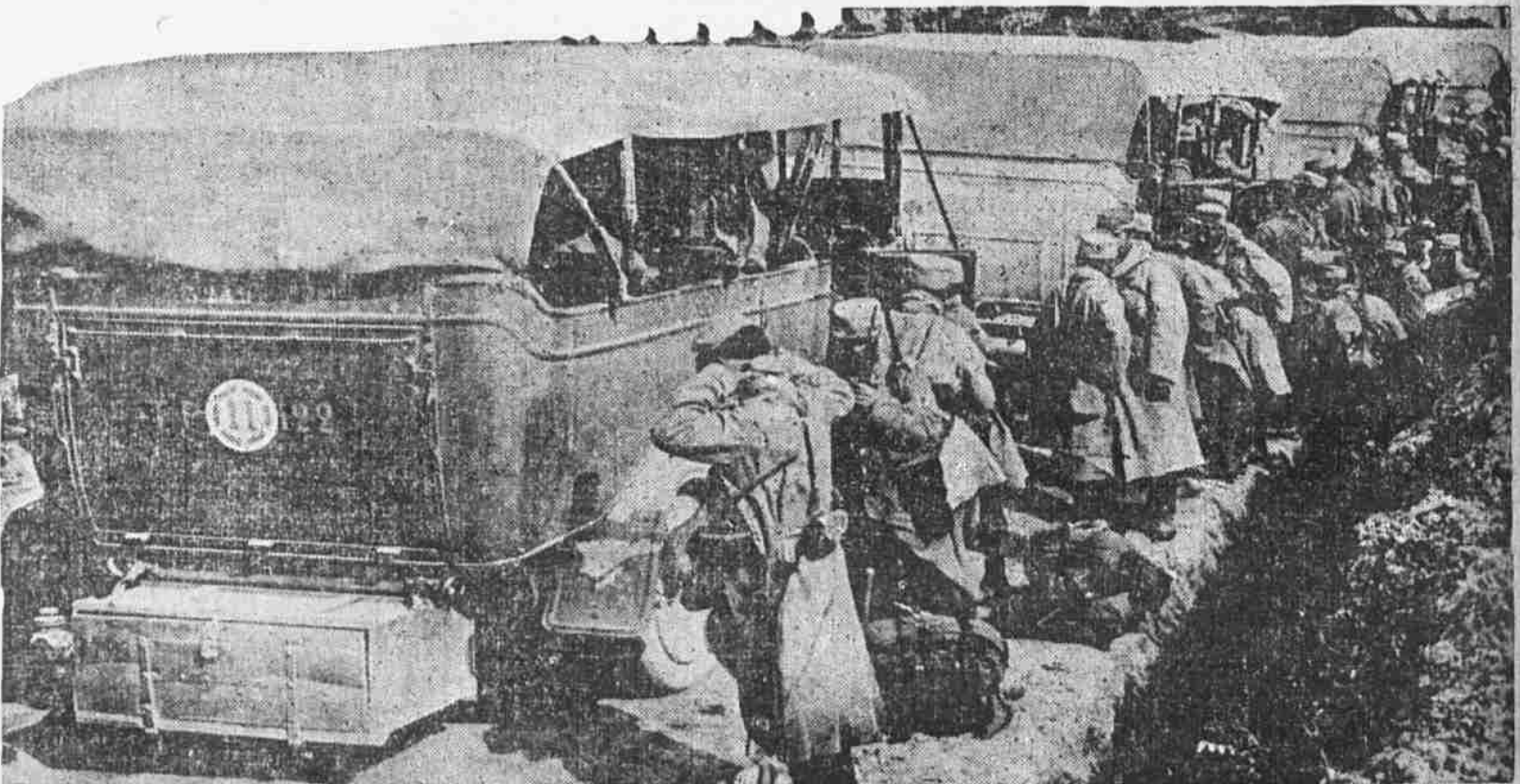

A company of reserves being transported to the firing line in motorcars has been waiting for the word to move forward. It was such an army in taxicabs which drove back the Germans at the Marne.

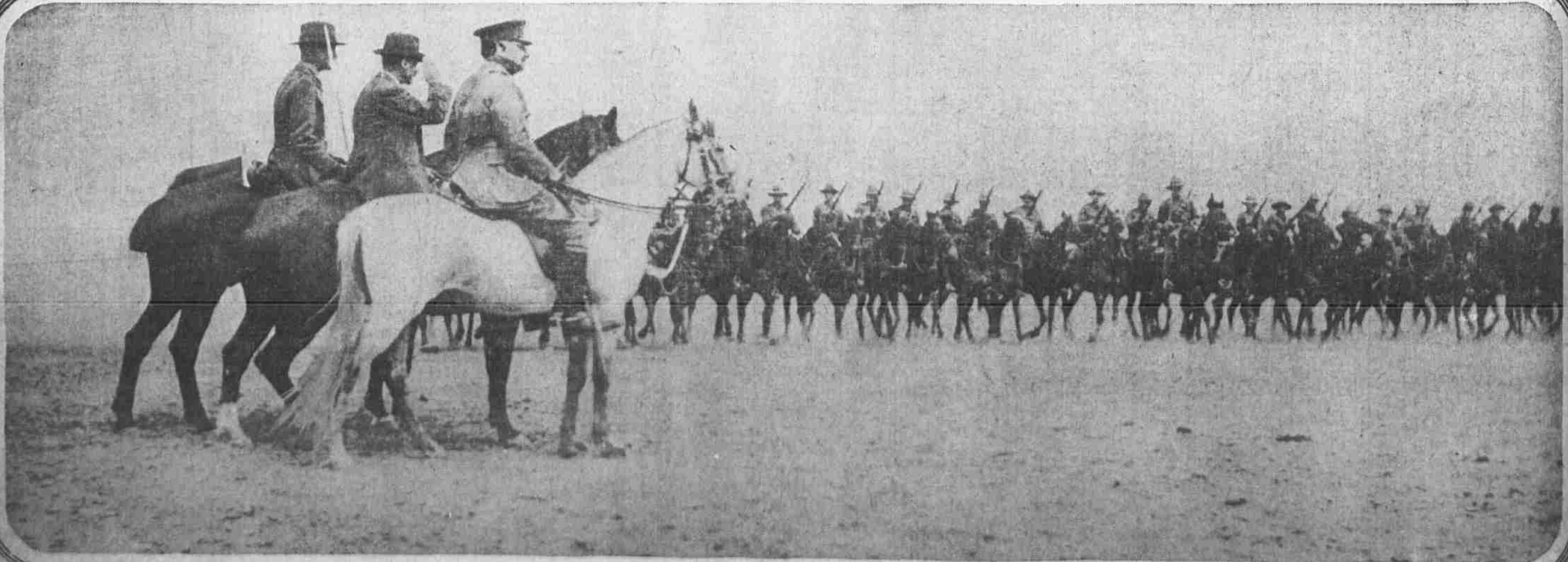
