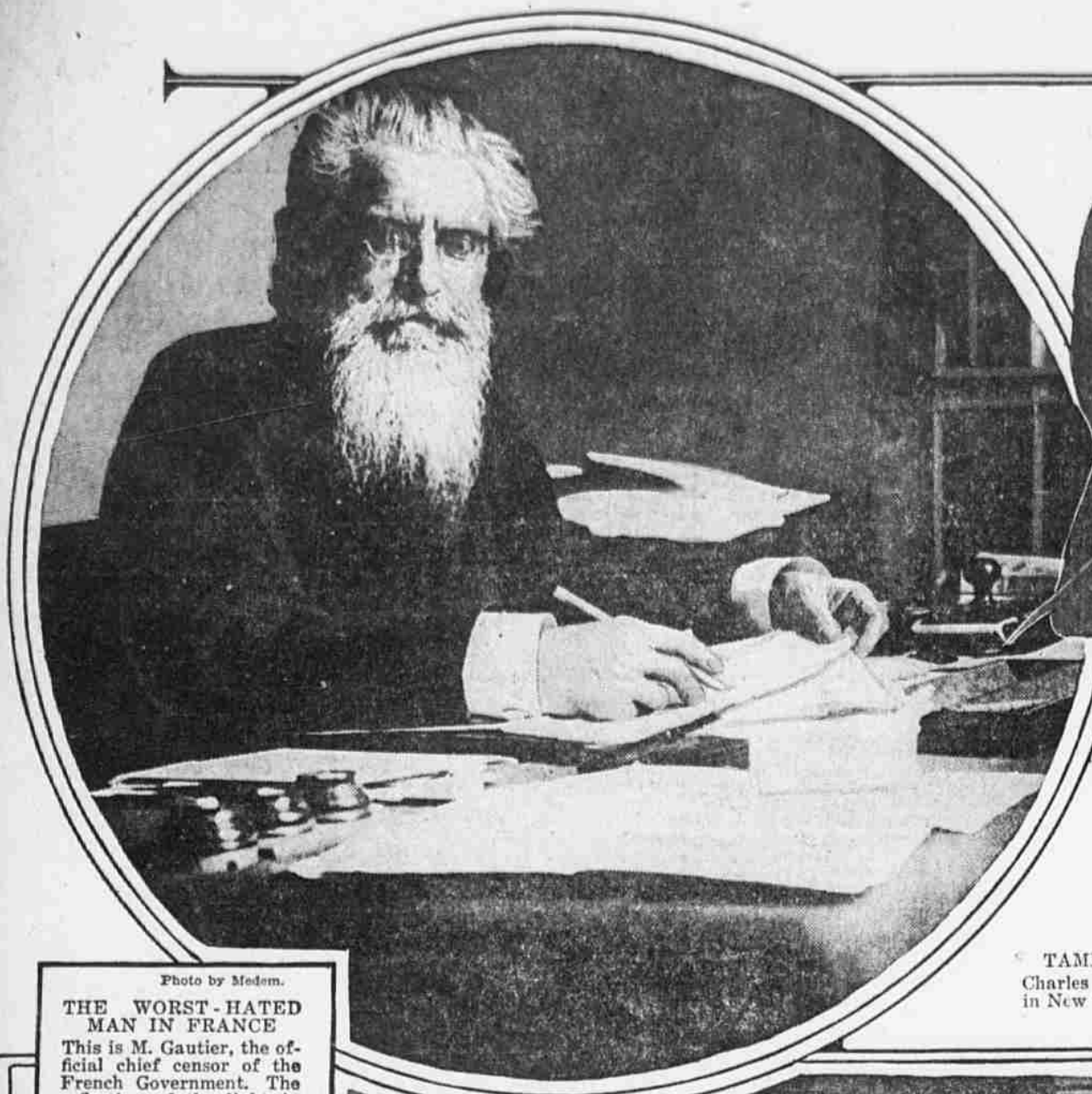

This is M. Gautier, the official chief censor of the French Government. The reflection of the light in his spectacles adds extra ferocity to his expression.

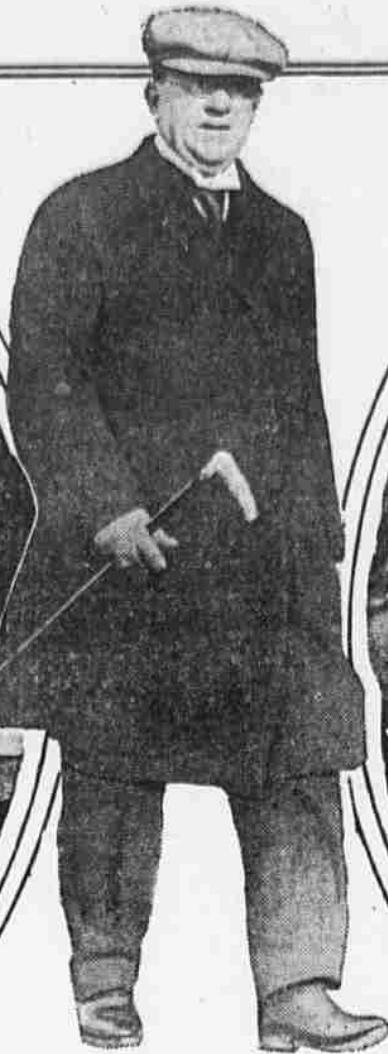

Secretary Lansing forgets the numerous foreign crises long enough to enjoy the links at Pinehurst.

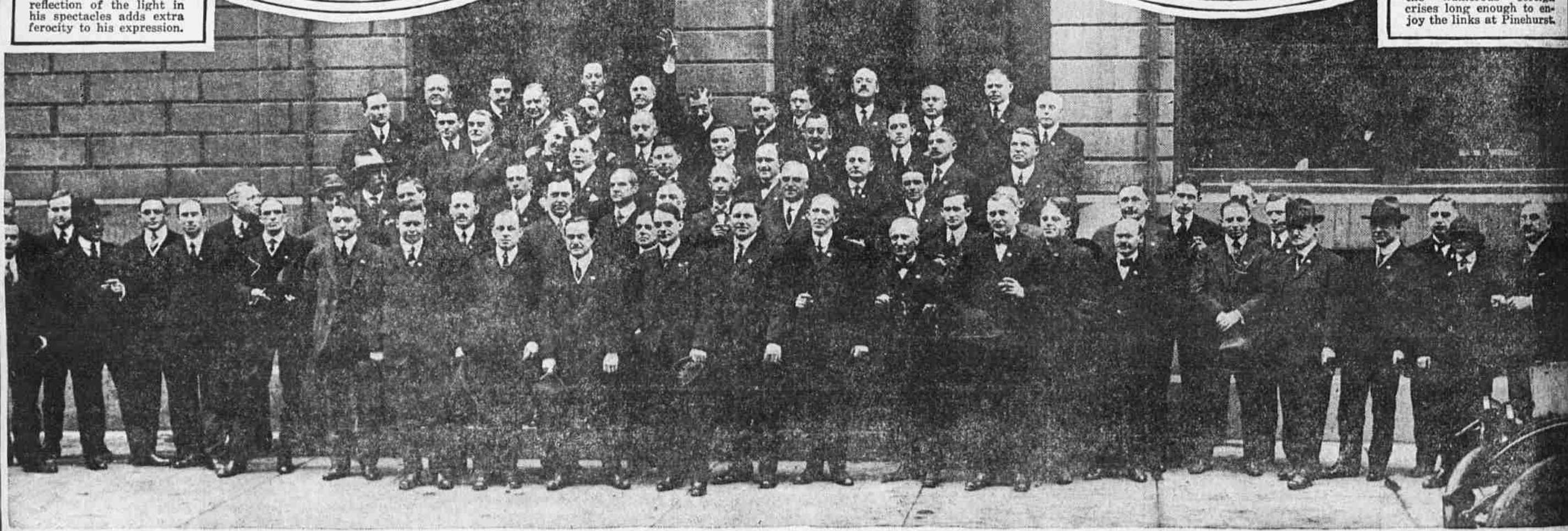
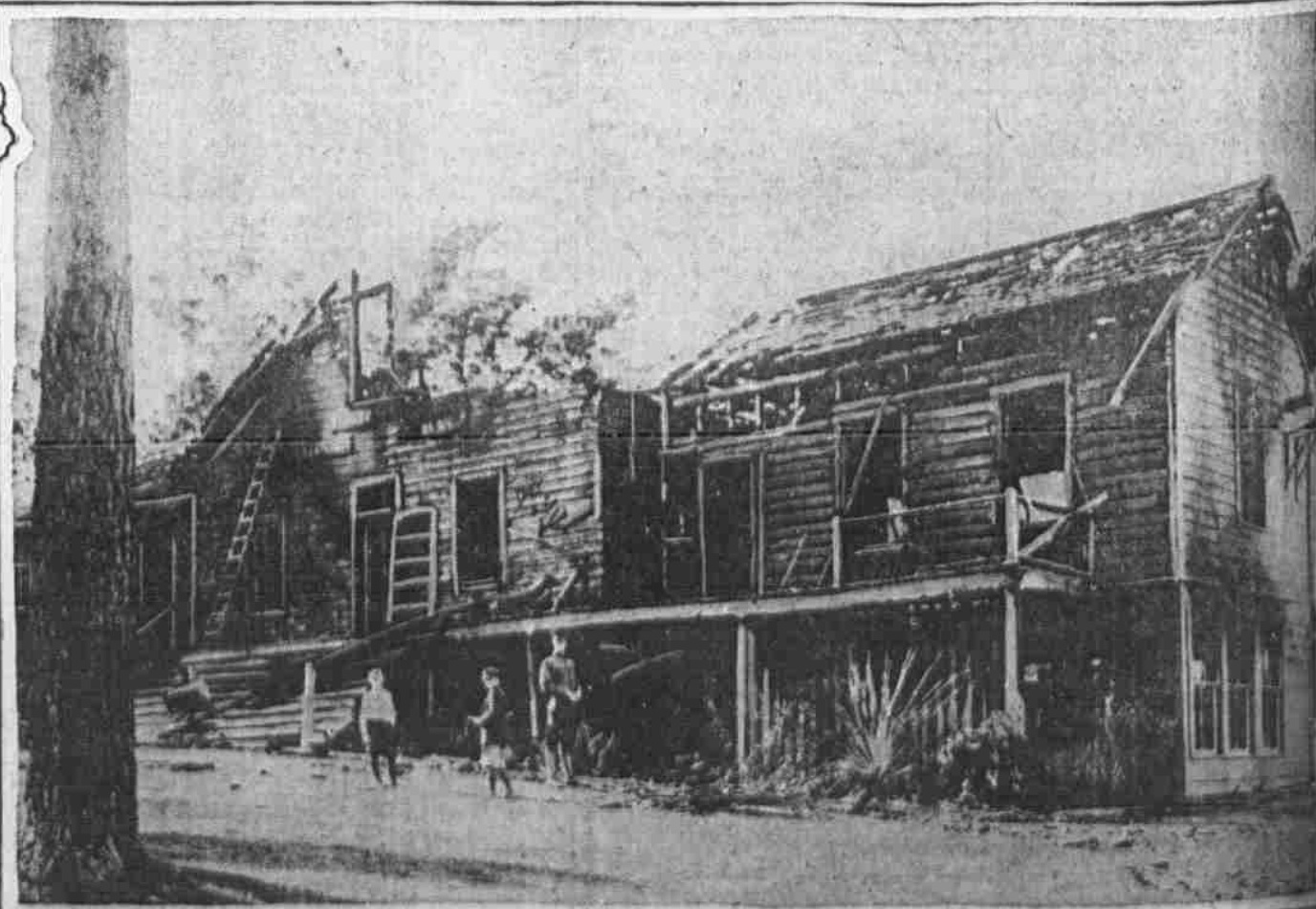
