

"Men must shut their eyes very often "Men must shut their eyes very often these days if they would keep their souls clean," he shouted, "Every vice has its root in vision. Young men commit many, many crimes which they would not otherwise commit because of what they see. The fashions of today tend toward the suggestion of sensuality."

"What friendships shall we make as Christians?" he then asked. "Be not unequally yoked together with unbelievers. Young woman, if you are engaged to a young man and marry him in unbelief, the curse of God will be upon you. Ah, there are in this audience men and

Ah, there are in this audience men and women who have shed scalding tears over the yoke that binds them to unbelief! A Christian man has no right to enter a partnership with an unchristian man, and if he does he will find himself involved in tricks that will blight his Christian experience."

Dancing, card playing and the theatre were all assailed as "instruments of the devil." "You cannot run a clean theatre and make it pay," he declared. Speaking on dancing, Mr. Nicholson said: "The hardest persons to bring to Christ are the dancing boy and girl. There is no delight in the dance except in the mingling of the sexes. I do not say that every girl who dances has evil thoughts, but, in the name of God, I beg you to think of the other person.
