

NANCY WYNNE TELLS OF PASSION PLAY TO BE GIVEN IN TWO WEEKS

Much Interest Centred About the Coming Production of the Passion Play During Passion Week at the Metropolitan Opera House—Other Matters

MANY persons are deeply interested in the "Passion Play," which will be given by the students of St. Joseph's College Dramatic Association during the fifth week in Lent, commonly known as Passion Week.

The subject of the play makes such a direct appeal to the human heart that it is a drama of men and women of social prominence and of every shade of religious belief have gladly lent their patronage to what is an altogether unique departure in the dramatic field.

The play will require a cast of more than 100 performers, an orchestra of 40 pieces and a chorus of 70 voices. Rehearsals have been going on for the last six months and, contrary to the ordinary usage, the majority of them have had to be held in the Metropolitan Opera House itself, since it is the only stage in town large enough for such a purpose.

The play will be given at least three times at night and twice during the afternoons, beginning the night of April 11.

LENTEN SPEAKER TELLS HOW TO END INDUSTRIAL STRIFE—Urges Obedience to Commandment, "Thou Shalt Not Steal"

There would be no strife between capital and labor today if the commandment, "Thou shalt not steal," were thoroughly lived up to, was the opinion of the Rev. Arthur T. Mincher, pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Immaculate, at the noon-day Lenten services at Old St. John's Lutheran Church, Race street below 6th, today.

"Labor would not be dissatisfied and would do better work," he said, "because of a feeling of absolute justice and fair play. But the fact that conditions are not ideal does not excuse either capital or labor from dealing honestly with one another."

JEWISH PILGRIM FATHERS' DAY TO BE SPLENDIDLY CELEBRATED

Committee of the Sisterhood of Congregation Keneseth Israel Hard at Work Preparing for Mammoth Presentation of a Pageant at Academy of Music

A COMMITTEE of the Sisterhood of Congregation Keneseth Israel, Broad street above Columbia avenue, with Mrs. Joseph Krauskopf as chairman, has been at work for some time preparing this year's celebration of Jewish Pilgrim Fathers' Day, a celebration that originated in Philadelphia at the time when the local Jewish community commemorated the 25th anniversary of the landing of the Jews in New Amsterdam.
