Theodore Justice, a member of the Fairmount Park Commission, has written a letter to Mayor Smith, protesting against the building of the Providence General Hospital in the Park, on the ground that drainage from the institution will pollute the waters of Wissahickon Creek, and finds its way into the Schuylkill River, from which a part of the city's water

supply is derived. After touching upon the plans of the Park Commission to beautify the hospital property, Mr. Justice says: "These facts should be weighed against the possible typhoid epidemic that may result from the drainage from the Providence Gen-eral Hospital into the drinking water of a large part of the population of Phila-delphia."
