This is a lyricdrama, weighty enough in some of its leaden moments, but relatively so imponderable in contrast with the formal music-drama of the "Ring" tetralogy as to be considered the light masterplece of the Bayreuth School, possibly excepting "Haensel und Gretel." a "marchen mit musik," with gossamery weaving of leitmusik," with gossamery weaving of leit-motiven and naivete of theme.
