DIAGHILEFF'S BALLET IN SECOND PROGRAM

Fantasy, Humor and Tragedy in Dancing, Sets and Music at Metropolitan

Again, after a brief Teutonic upheaval, the Russian ballet! Again the over-whelming of the senses with color, light and movement, in the fantastic, the grotesque and the tragic moods of the dance and pantomime. For the "Scheherazade" of the opening program there was "Cleo-patre," for "l'Olseau de Feu" there was "Soleil de Nuit." and to add to "Carnaval," which was repeated, there was "La Spectre de la Rose." It was a program not more varied, not more immediately pleasing and not all the separate numbers

of it were as effective as their counter-parts of the first night. This time there was, however, some-thing added in the "Solell de Nuit" (The Midnight Sun), which was intensely racial, sould have sprung from nowhere outside of Russia--and it turned out to be the high-light of the evening's program. Cer-tainly the edge was taken off "Cleopatre" by the more daring, the more beautiful and the more dramatically effective story of the Arabian nights, in which also love and death are mingled. The story of the youth who is dazzled by the fatal enchant-ment of the Queen of the Sapphire Nile, who desorts his lowly love for the Queen's passing favor and, gratified, drinks the cup of death, is eminently fitted for the miming of the Ballet Russe; but the

Egyptian setting is hard and the sensu-ourness, the dreadful voluptuousness of Zobeide and her paramour could not be paralleled. So that it was only tragedy, without much of passion or of beauty, which filled the gloomy halls with their which filled the gloomy halfs with their monstrous and misshapen pillars and huge gods. Even the dancing here was not perfect; the music, by many hands, was intercesting, and the costuming superb. But it did not go! The lovely dream of the "Spectre of the Rose," set to Weber's familiar "invitation to the Dance" was an interlude which

to the Dance," was an interlude which combined with the final piece, the "Car-naval," set to Schumann's music. M.
