



This is the first American flag planted on the soil of the little country recently "pacified" by the Marine Corps, who unfurled the banner at Cape Haitien.




BEARDS SPROUT ON FACES OF MEXICAN CAMPAIGNERS

things, too.





PROMINENT FIGURES IN THE DAILY SESSIONS OF THE WILMINGTON METHODIST CONFERENCE
