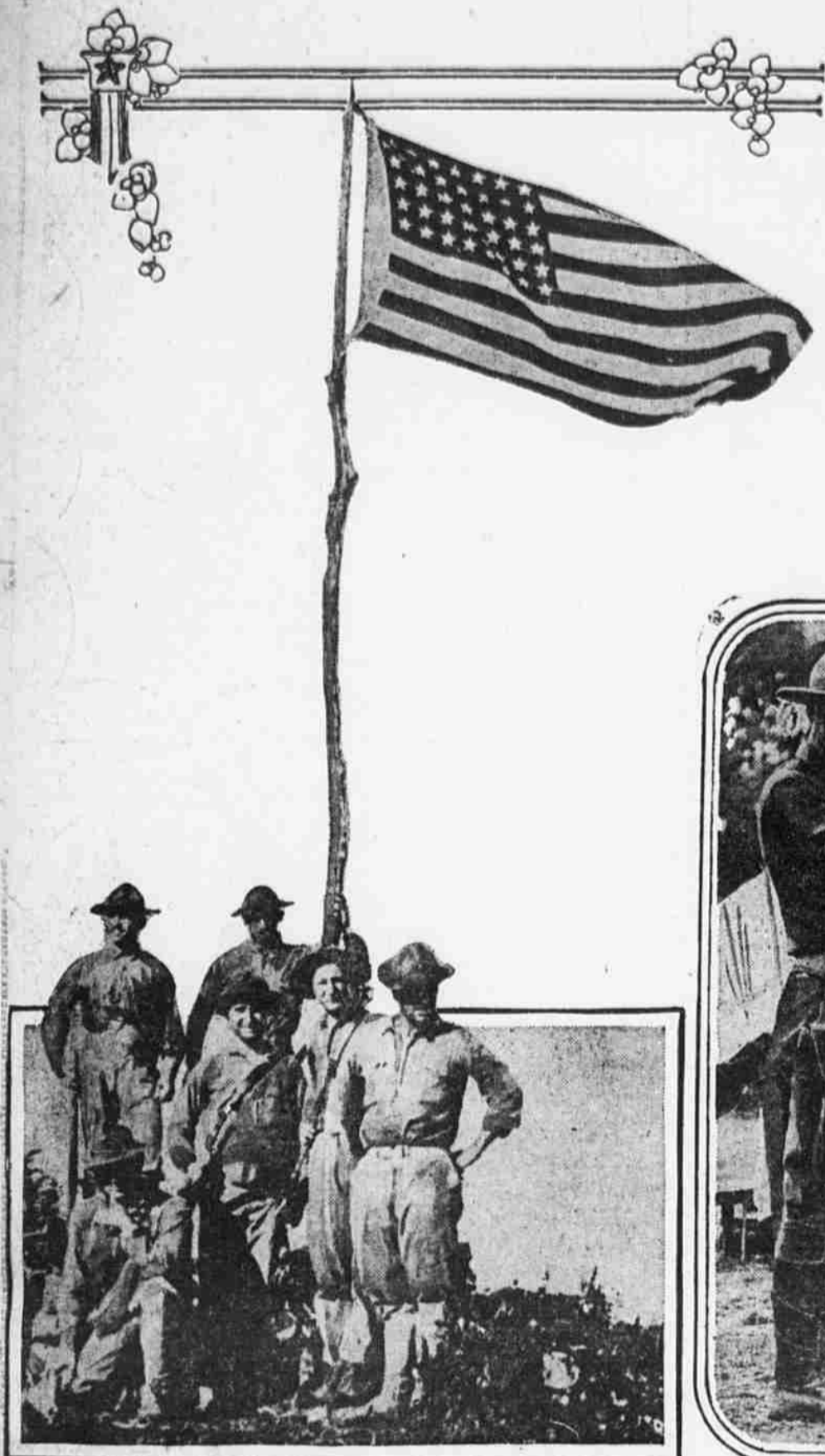

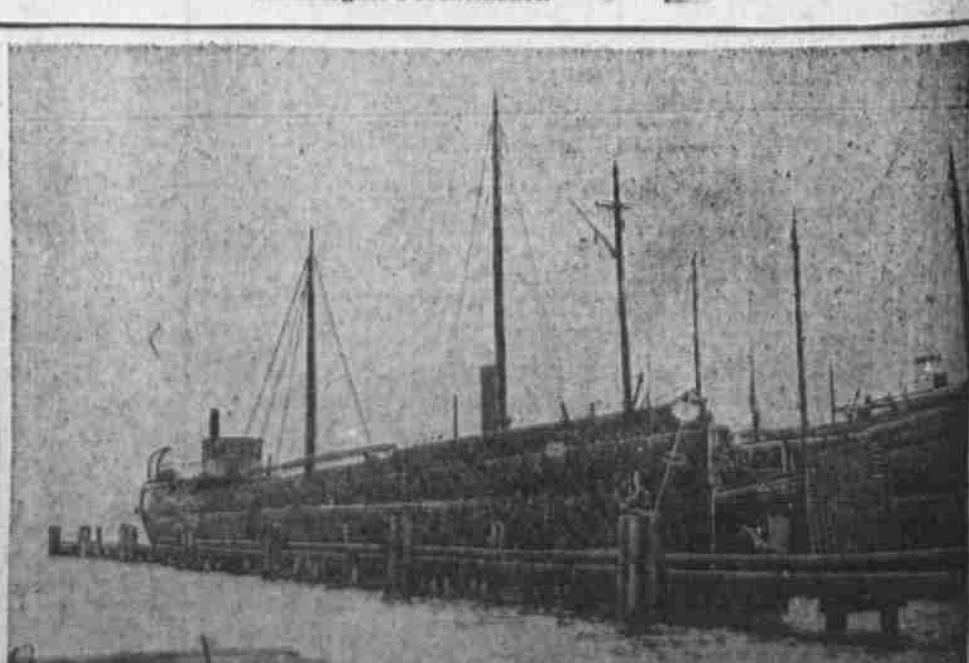
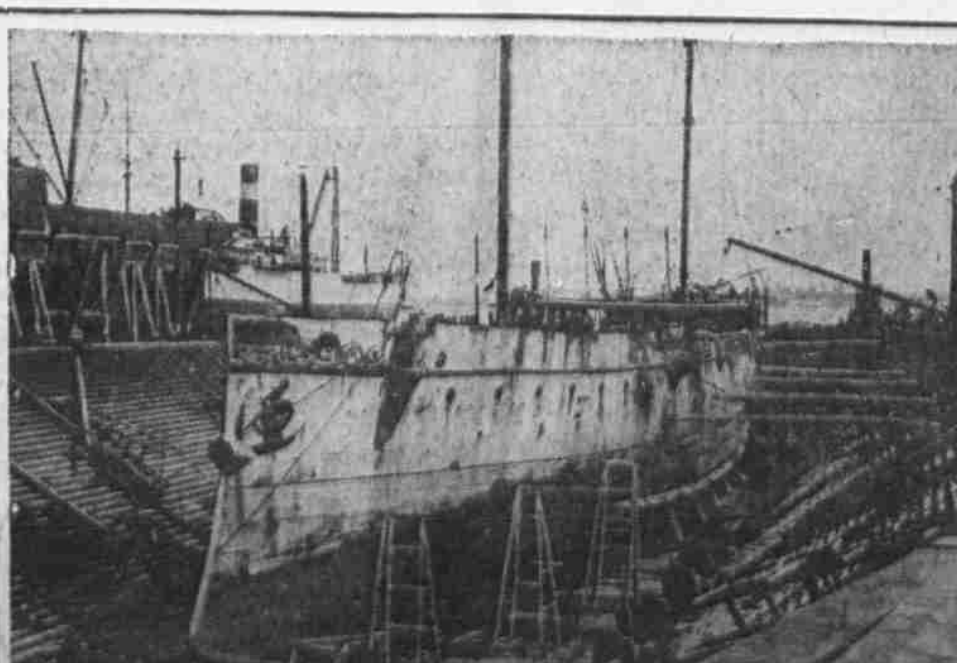
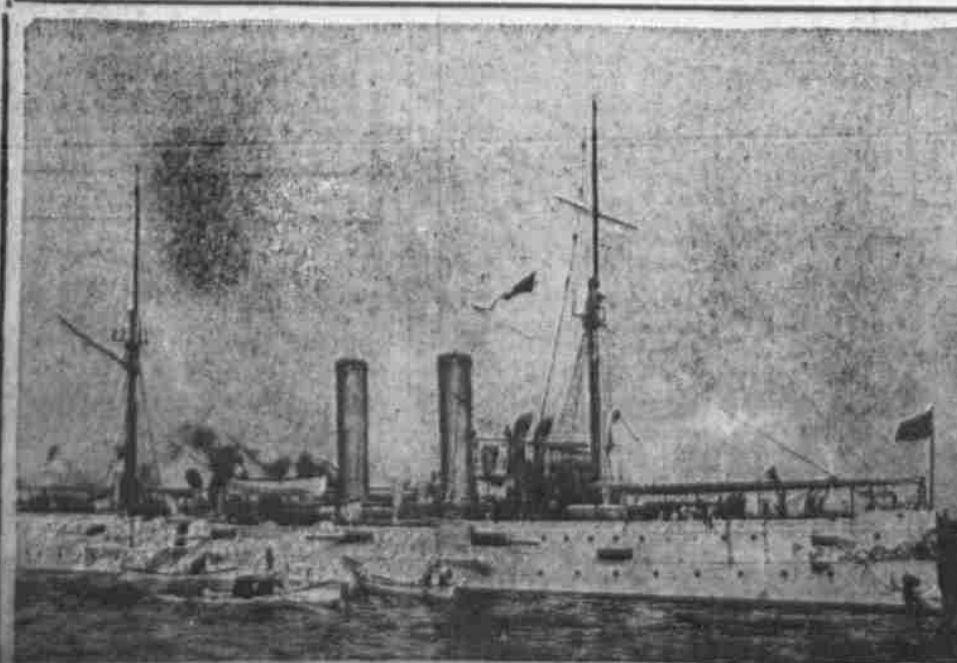
BEARDS SPROUT ON FACES OF MEXICAN CAMPAIGNERS
