SPLENDID PROGRAM AT RUSSIAN BALLET

Oriental Magnificence and Classic Splendors Mingle in Third Bill

With the dancing and miming of the third program of the Russian Ballet half of the all-too-brief season at the Metropolitan was over tast night. There remains, with a virtually new bill tonight, including the formerly scandalous "Aftincluding the formerly scandalous "Afternoon of a Faun," the languorous seductiveness of "Themer," and the gay trans-Caucanian reveilings of "Prince Igor," the second half of the series with a beginning as brilliant as that of last Monday night. There will be a novelty Saturday afternoon, and the bill of that evening will be made up of four of the favorite dances.

and altitude of its greatest triumphs. It had, for the racial material in which it adds revelation of new things to revelation of new things to revelation of old—and who shall say which is more precious?—Petrouchka. a fantastic tale of love of three parionettes unhappily endowed with life. The tale itself is all whimsical, and its dancing by Mile Lydia Lopokova, the enraptured ballerins, and MM Massine and Bolm and the aged Cecchettl, was equisite. But for us the set-tings, not so much the scenery by Benois. chetti, was equisite. But for us the ser-tings, not so much the scenery by Benois as the scenes devised by Michel Fokine in which all of Russia comes to the fair and takes part in dancing and ribaldry and galety, were the chiefest interest. No one fancies that the Ballet Russe is here Interpret Russia to us, but the fact is that in this piece, as in "Solell de Nuit" and in "Prince Igo." they do reveal to us w a great nation lives in the moments f its intensest activity.

More popular by far, though not so pleasing to the critical spirit, was the lance arrangement called "Les Sylphides," to music of Chopin. This ballet was seen here when Anna Pavlowa danced it, and her absence was deeply felt. The infal-lible taste of Russians in these matters made the performance last night beautiful. but the newer troupe could not capture the fine conventional spirit of the classic ballet, and not one of the three danseuses, Miles Lopokova and Mmes Lubov and Tchernichewa, could equal the unearthly lightness, the freedom and the grace of Paylowa. The figurings of the ballet were beautiful, the total effect pleasing. But tince Diaghileff has made a virtue of the vitalized ballet, he cannot make an equal virtue of the archaic. "Les Sylphides" was necessary for a well-balanced program; as has been said, it was very well received. But it was not great.

"Scheherazade" was. Neither the Monday night performance nor that witnessed by the writer several weeks ago in New York equaled that of last night in the fire and fury of its execution. The or-chestra, led by M. Ernest Ansermet, at last threw itself into the work, made each sharp sensuous stab of it deep and poig-nant, and the dancers revoled in a new sense of excitement and vivacity. The dancers who came in for the feast came n as in a swiftly moving frieze, and the negroes leaped in a mad glory of pleas-

Leon Bakst displayed no new sets in this program, and the honors for scenery go naturally to Alexandre Benois for the "Petrouchka." Benois is a younger man and works in a cruder style, but there is genius in him. The decor for "Les Sylphides" was by Dohoujinsky—a garden with billowing trees and small consecrated places.
