Last night the Ballet returned with the full energies at its disposal to the scene and altitude of its greatest triumphs. It had, for the racial material in which it had revealed a new thing to revelation of old—and who shall say which is more precious—"Petrovichka," a fantastic tale of love of three marionettes unhappily endowed with life.
