

SPRING TRADE OUTLOOK CONSIDERED PROMISING

Large Volume of Local Business, With Prices Firm

Business conditions in the Philadelphia district continue most encouraging. The volume of business is large; prices remain firm and every indication is for a favorable trade for the entire year.

Cotton yarns are in especial demand, dealers reporting that they are unable to fill their orders. Wool is quiet, the supply being attributed to the fact that most of the mills are well supplied with raw material for immediate requirements and are not disposed to buy ahead.

"The trade in domestic lead tobacco has been fair during the last week and modest sales reported. Inquiries being made for good grades of Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Ohio, but prices are said to be somewhat high.

"Wholesalers and jobbers in groceries report conditions slightly quieter, but satisfactory; collections normal. A good feeling, however, as to future business is prevalent. Coffee is quiet, with but little trading; offerings are light. Cost and freight market unchanged. Tea market satisfactory; good demand in certain grades. Sugar is quiet, but shows a slight advance, the usual 2 per cent. discount being quoted for cash in seven days."

JOHNSON RESIGNS; AMBLER IS SILENT

Continued until after I have had a talk with him," said Ambler. The speaker called attention to the fact that Johnson in his letter to the Governor and the Attorney General did not define his attitude toward Ambler in the future.

The resignation of Johnson brought to light some of the "inside" information about the break between the Governor and Senator Penrose.

"I guess that's what any man in public life in his position would have said," he remarked. "The people of the county are with me," he said. "I am not about to be closed. I said all I had to say in my letter."

"LIES," RAYBROWN Both the Governor and the Attorney General, in answer to Johnson's letters, flatly denied Johnson's assertions. Attorney General Brown bluntly branded and asserted the assertions of Johnson "lies."

"I hope he received a sufficient price and took no promises for his self-satisfaction," the Attorney General's answer concluded.

In sending his resignation to the Governor, Mr. Johnson enclosed a copy of a letter which he wrote to the Attorney General. This message to Mr. Brown recites in detail the alleged political activities. It is as follows:

"I am in receipt of the following letter from the Attorney General's department, bearing date of March 21, 1916: 'To Hon. Charles Johnson, 'Northampton, Pa. My dear Sir:

"I beg to suggest the importance of obtaining declarations or interviews from the prominent people of your district who are favorable to the Governor and the state which he has taken for the reuniting of the party, etc. These from Republicans and from Progressives, who left the party and have since returned, will be most effective. They will be given publicity throughout the State.

"Please give this your prompt, earnest attention and send such declarations, together with the names of the persons to whom they are sent, which you deem to be of interest, and that will be helpful to me. 'With assurances of my regard and good wishes, I am, 'Very truly yours, 'FRANCIS SHUNK BROWN' Although my name and address had been filled in on the typewriter and the signature of your name, the letter is plainly a mimeographed copy, and has doubtless been sent to every other State official, who responded to your summons to a meeting held in the Governor's private study on March 21, 1916. Although I have taken an active part in politics for many years, I have never seen anything comparable with that meeting, or with your mimeographed copy of March 21. The men whom you called together in the Governor's room are paid by the people of this Commonwealth to transact the public business in their various departments, and to advance the interest of any man or clique in Pennsylvania politics.
