

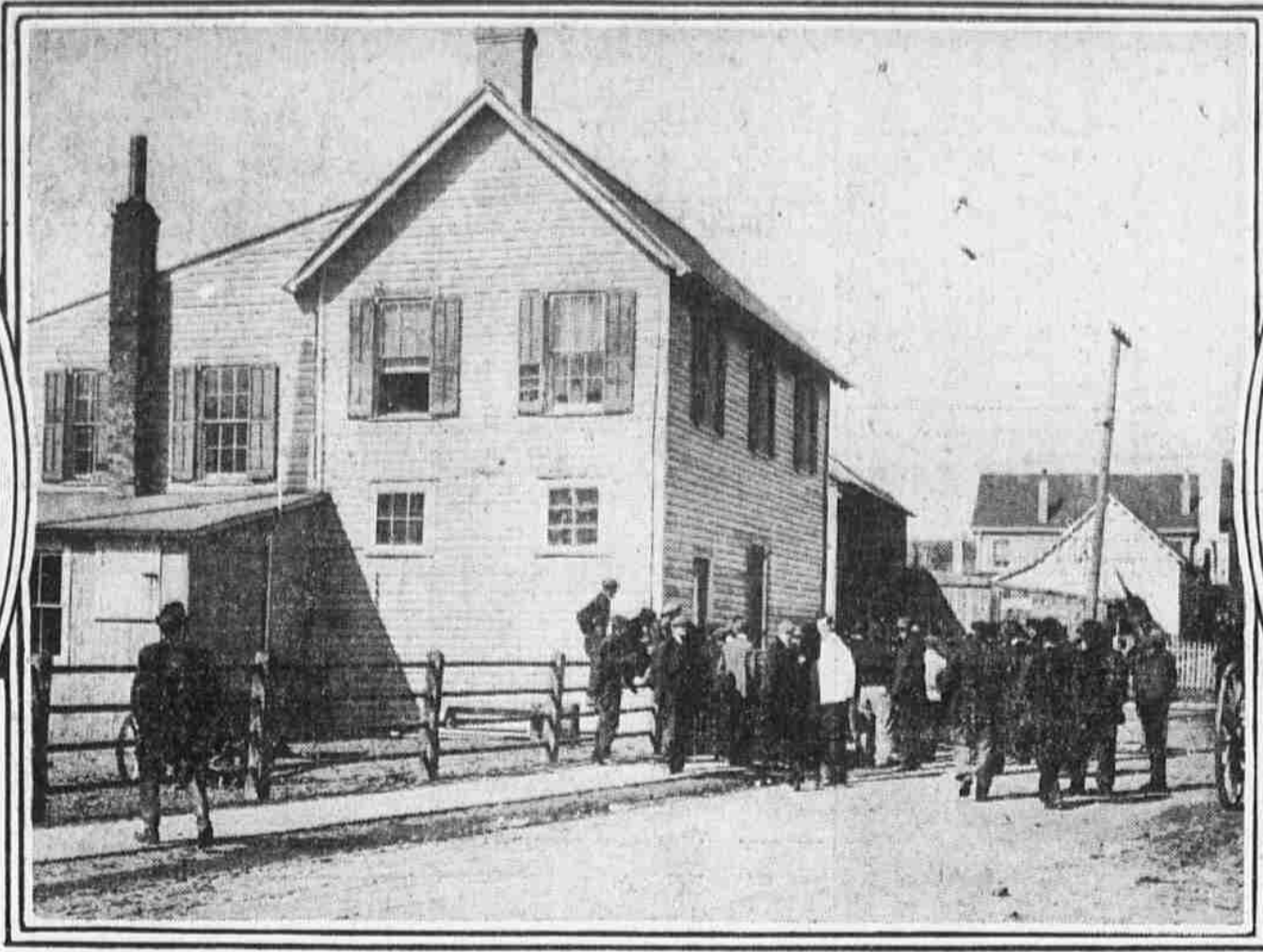

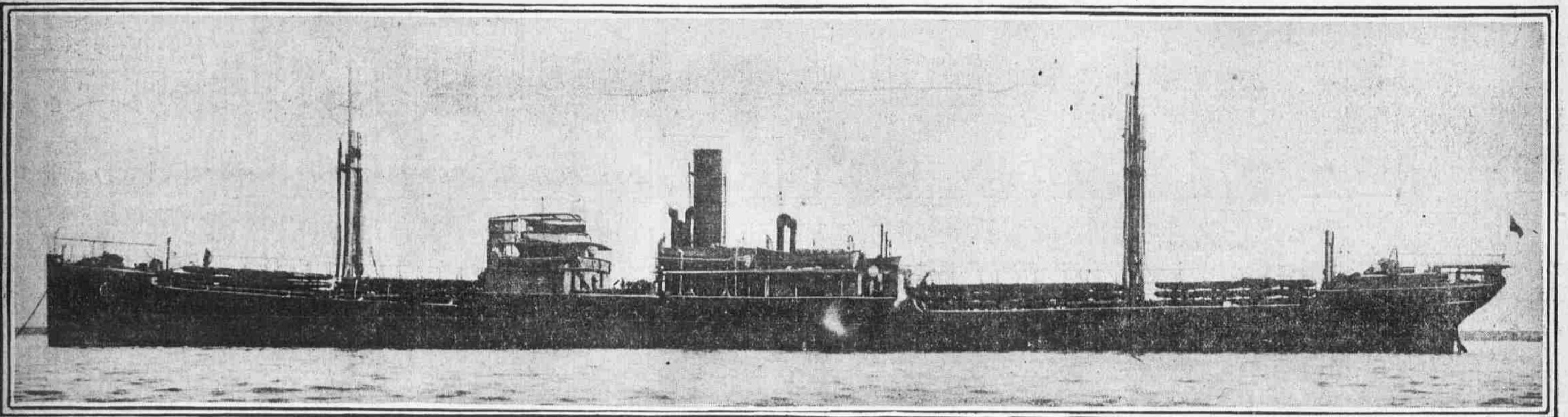

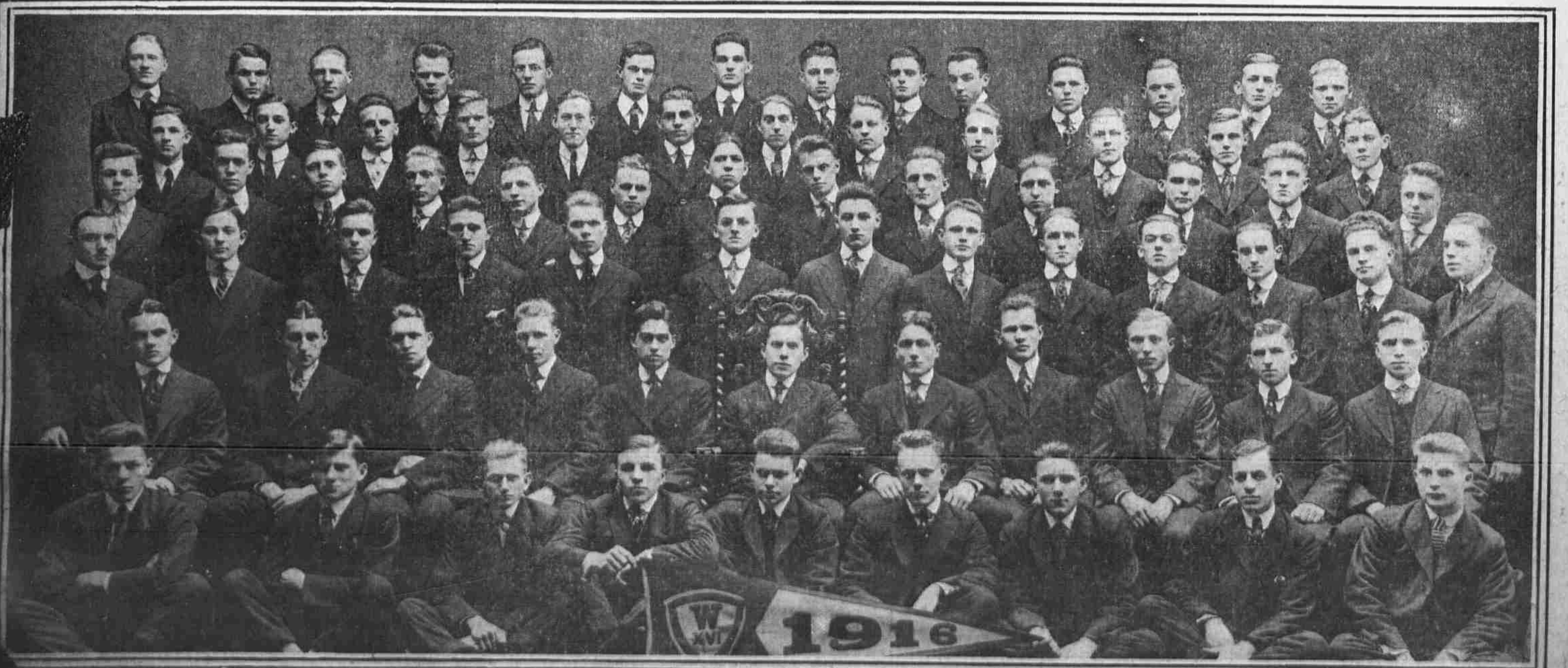

GERMAN STOWAWAY WHO HELD UP BRITISH STEAMSHIP SINGLE-HANDED, CAPTAIN WHO WAS FORCED TO OBEY HIS ORDERS AND CUSTOM HOUSE AT LEWES, DEL., TO WHICH HE WAS TAKEN AFTER CAPTURE
At the right is Ernest Schiller, principal in the most dramatic episode of a very dramatic war, who lay in hiding for five days aboard the steamship Matoppo before he held up Captain Richard Bergner, on the left, and a crew of 56 men for 24 hours, after four fellow conspirators had deserted him at Hoboken. He was captured off Cape Henlopen when a signal to the lifesaving station there brought Federal officers.
