AMHERST CLUBS WILL GIVE CONCERT AT BELLEVUE TONIGHT

Glee and Mandolin Clubs of Amherst to Appear in This City for First Time in Many Years—Rose Garden Will Be Appropriate Background

FOR the first time in many years the Amherst College Glee and Mandolin Clubs will appear in this vicinity, when they hold their concert in the Bellevue-Stratford rose garden tonight.

It is anticipated that this will be one of the notable mid-Lenten social events in Philadelphia. The clubs are on their annual spring tour, which opened with a joint concert with Union College in Schenectady, N. Y.

After holding concerts at the Toms School in Port Deposit and in Washington, the clubs have reached Philadelphia on their return trip and will wind up the tour tomorrow night in Brooklyn.

According to time-honored tradition governing the opening of every Amherst concert in the past, the first number on the program will be "Love's Labour's Lost," presented by the combined clubs and said by Owen Wister to be the best college song ever written. The rest of the program is characterized by a variety of numbers, including selections by the Glee Club Quartet, which have never failed to win a round of hearty applause; some lively popular music by a sextet from the mandolin club; college and popular songs by the full clubs, both together and separately; and some solo work by Mr. Stinson, who is said to possess the best baritone voice in any American college.

Amherst has always been popularly known as a "New England Singing College," and the men of this year's class chosen to represent her on this trip will be well able, according to all reports, after a most successful preliminary season, which included tours throughout the New England States, to maintain the best traditions of the college.

Mr. Eric H. Marks, '17, son of the president of the borough of Manhattan, New York, is manager of this year's club. Harold L. Gillies, '16, of Nyack, N. Y., is leading the glee club, while Mr. Robert S. Gillett, '16, of Hartford, Conn., is the mandolin club leader. Prof. Charles W. Cobb of the college has been directing the work of the glee club.
