# NANCY WYNNE TELLS OF THE NEEDS OF FRENCH CHILDREN THESE DAYS

### Poor Children's Country Homes No Longer Exist, Used for Refugees-Food and Clothes Greatly Needed for the Little Ones and Their Mothers

In the war, is certain. Miss Jane Bates, of Villanova, and Miss E. B. Jackson, of 2228 Spruce street, have received appeals from Mrs. Julia Tyler Fleurot, who is working with the soldiers in Paris and is now turning her attention to the children as well. Mrs. Fleurot writes Miss Bates inclosing a letter from Mrs. Nora Davenport, who has undertaken the care of 80 small children herself. Mrs. Davenport says that Dr. George Migot and his wife some years ago started up a mission school with a country home for the children in Trilport. Doctor Migot was a minister and studied medicine in order to be able to do more personally for the poor and devoted his life to this work, sending the fil children to the country every summer, teaching them trades and relieving the misery of the slums (the Charonne quarters of Paris). Doctor Migot died a few weeks ago and his assistants now find themselves face to face with many difficulties. The country home has been taken by the village of Trilport for the refugees of war, so about all the workers can do now is to try and provide food and clothes for the 300 children they have formerly cared for. Mrs. Fleurot says: "I am sending the letter (Mrs. Davenport's) to show you how much a little money would help to feed some of these children-there are 300and this Mrs. Davenport is undertak ing, and has since the war, to take care of 80 alone with any help she could get. If you can get some of your friends interested in collecting a little money. It is a wonderful charity-and they are in need; also we would be grateful for any clothes for children from the ages of 10 to 14. You have no idea how far a little money goes if one just puts it in the right place. There are so many daily individual cases. I hope that soon this fearful war will be over-every one here is feeling happy over the present battleit must weaken the enemy immensely, Please remember mo to Miss Jand tell her that the American Ambulance is quite empty just now; none of the Verdun wounded has been brought to Paris.
