NEW YORK. April 6.—Automobile manufacturers have given full indorme-ment to the plans thus far made for a company backed by the motorcar indus-try to manufacture gasoline. The sub-det was taken up at the conclusion of a meeting of the directors of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce. After the members heard reports of what had been done, including the incorporation of the Motor Fuel Corporation with an initial capital of \$25,000, "the manufacturers," according to report sent out by the na-tional chamber last night, "gave tangible evidence of entiminaties co-operation and pledged additional financial support to the preliminary work of the company." The total shipments of automobiles, for NEW YORK, April 6.-Automobile

preliminary work of the company." The total shipments of automobiles, for the month of March amounted to 28,600 carloads. This was a gain of 11,400 from March of last year and by 5000 carloads breaks the best previous monthly record in the history of the industry. At the pres-ent rate of increase, it is estimated that the total sale of cars in 1916 will reach 1,250,000, which means a distribution of something like one car to every 50 per-sons in the United States. If the pres-ent demand continues, there will be at the end of the year close to 3,500,000 cars needing gasoline in the United States.
