CHICAGO, April 7.—Believing that all the bad news with regard to winter wheat was out with the publication of the Government report on the condition of the erop today, conservative traders and com-mission houses sold, and, following strength, the market weakened.

The Government put the status of the crop as of April 1 at 78.3, indicating a yield of 495,000,000 bushels, against 655,045,000 bushels in 1915, a reduction of 24 per cent, due to a wet cold fall, which caused poor seed bed and an unfavorable start. A condition of from 78 to 79 per cent, had been looked for.

B. W. Snow said that the yield forecast represents the outside possible size of the crop.

Late in the day there was covering of the Illinois State report, which said that the average amount winter killed in that State was 35 per cent. PLAN OF REORGANIZATION FOR ROCK ISLAND ANNOUNCED

Provides for Issuance of \$25,000,000 8 Per Cent. Preferred Rights

NEW YORK, April 7 .- The committee, of which N. L. Amster is chairman, has issued a plan of reorganization for the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway Company, which provides for the sub-scription by stockholders on a pro-rata basis, to \$25,000,000 8 per cent, preferred basis to \$25,000,000 8 per cent. preferred rights, or 8 per cent. 30-year debenture income bonds. Every stockholder will have the privilege of subscribing \$33 par value of the new issue, at par for each share of old stock owned.

The new security will be accumulative after June 30, 1917, at the rate of 6 per cent. a year, convertible into common stock at par up to December 31, 1927, and callable on any dividend or interest

and callable on any dividend or interest date at 110 and accrued dividend or in-terest on 90 days' notice after December

Payments are to be made in four instalments, as follows: 10 per cent. 10 days after the plan has been declared oper-ative, 30 per cent. 30 days after the first payment 30 per cent. 90 days after the second payment and 30 per cent. 90 days after the third payment.

It is proposed to use the proceeds of the new \$25,000,000 issue as follows: \$11,600,-600 to pay off short-term collateral notes and \$5,100,000 to pay off outstanding receivers' certificates. This would require a total of \$16,700,000 and would leave a balance in the treasury for other purposes of \$8,300,000.
