TEUTON PEACE TERMS IN HOLLWEG SPEECH

Reventlow Asserts Chancellor's Declaration Means Continuation of Present Submarine Policy

UNITY IN GOVERNMENT

High Official Avers End of War by Autumn Seems Possible

BERLIN, April 7 Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg laid before the world the terms on which Germany will consent to the ending of the war in his address before the Reich-stag Wednesday.

This was the interpretation today of the This was the interpretation today of the Lokal Angeiger, Vessigehe Zeitung and the Tageblatt, three of the most influential newspapers of Germany. All three papers emphasized the statement of peace terms to the exclusion of all other features of Chancellor's most comprehensive

Count Reventlow, the "German fire-brand," alone laid stress on the importance of the Chancellor's remarks regarding the submarine, assuring his readers that Bethmann-Hollweg reiterated firmly Ger-many's determination to continue the present policy.

This interpretation may be of the greatest significance in view of the statement of a high German Government official that peace in Europe by autumn is a reasonable possibility. This statement was made in the course of an interview in which this official, whose name cannot be used. emphasized the complete unity of the Government on all war policies and de-nied that there was anything alarming in the food situation.

On the first point, he explained, the Government leaders know just where they stand, an important ministerial conference having fully informed them cerning the food question, he added that he had just received personal assurances from the Interior and Commerce Minis-

"We have not an abundance," said this official, "but we are not going to starve or be forced by gunger to yield."

"Some people," it was suggested, "have interpreted Admiral von Tirpitz's resig-nation and the bread-and-buter shortage as indicating that Germany is in serious

"That's what our enemies would like to have the world believe," replied the Government official, "but let them wait and see. The German Government is ab-
