

"BIG ARMY" MEN NOW BOOM SCHEME FOR WAR STRENGTH OF 375,000

Preparedness Advocates in Senate, Pleased by Adoption of Volunteer System, Now Plan Increase of Regular Forces.

FEAR HITCH WITH HOUSE

Hostility to Volunteer Clause There Expected to Produce Deadlock

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The preparedness fight in the Senate is centered about the regular army. With the Federal volunteer army plan adopted, the "big army" men rushed forward their proposals to increase the number of regulars beyond the enlargement recommended by the Military Affairs Committee.

The fear that the Federal volunteer army will be killed in the Conference Committee through the refusal of the House to agree to it has also strengthened the argument for more than doubling the regular army.

JEFFERSON MAY JOIN MERGER OF U. OF P. AND MEDICO-CHI

Dean Pepper Tells Undergraduates Plan Is Being Considered

The probable inclusion of the Jefferson Medical College in the proposed merger of the Medical School of the University of Pennsylvania with the Medico-Chirurgical College, making this city one of the greatest centers of medical education, was the talk of "Jeff" students and professors today as they went to and from class.

The news came as a surprise at a banquet of the Undergraduate Medical Association of the University, at the Littenhouse Hotel, last night. Dr. William Pepper, dean of the University Medical School, not only announced that plans for the proposed Pennycuik-Medico-Chi merger were progressing, but added that for four or five weeks propositions had been made to include Jefferson, one of the largest medical schools in the country, independent of university support.

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ARTHUR SPIEGEL DIES; MOVIES' MILLIONAIRE

Chicago Head of Equitable Motion Picture Company Succumbs Suddenly in N. Y.

NEW YORK, April 7.—Arthur Spiegel, president of the Equitable Motion Picture Company and a director in a dozen Chicago corporations, died today at the Hotel Plaza. He was stricken with pneumonia on Monday night.

Spiegel was only 31 years old, yet was ranked as a multi-millionaire through his own business efforts. He was principal owner of the Spiegel-May-Stearn Company, a \$20,000,000 Chicago mail order corporation.

WILLIAM A. READ, NEW YORK BANKER, DIES

Head of Banking House and Financial Figure Succumbs Suddenly

NEW YORK, April 7.—William A. Read, head of the firm of William A. Read & Co. and long a prominent figure in the financial world, died suddenly early today.

Mr. Read was a director of the Bank of New York, a trustee of the Central Trust Company of New York, a trustee of the Alliance Assurance Company of London and a member of a number of clubs.

In financial circles Mr. Read's judgment of security values had been highly regarded for years. He was an expert in municipal and railroad issues. Mr. Read was born in Brooklyn on May 20, 1858.
