Rev. John Howard Melish Deplores War's Effect on Modern Civilization

"This generation has miserably falled," said the Rev. John Howard Melish today, at moonday Lentan services at St. Stephen's Church, 10th street above Chestnut. He preached from Rom., viii, 39—'I am persuaded that neither death nor life shall be able to separate us from the love of God which we have in Christ Jesus."

"Tailore is written upon the face of the modern tinies. Not only have we desiroyed the work of our own fingers, but we have laid desserating hands upon the works of our ancestors. The glery that was Rheims, the grandeur that was Louvain's, lie in the dust. We stood before the crisis of modern times, and we failed, we falled, Germany is a ghastly failure, France is a failure, England is a failure, Italy and the United States are failures.

"Where is our boasted science, our re-ligion, our philanthropy, our socialism? All have been unequal to the task before us, and we stand before the blast like an oak stripped and broken.

"America is facing the crisis of its history. Woe unto us if we make the wrong choice. If we have a faithless generation, great shall be our condemnation in the centuries to come.

"Under the brutality of this world war "Under the brutality of this world war multitudes are losing faith in ideals and are placing faith in force. They seem to forget the 100 years of peace which America has maintained with our great commercial and territorial rival without the aid of armies and navies, and are now preferring to trust, not God, but horses and chariots.

"It is a time for every one of us to determine where he stands, and then, having done all, stand. Force is destroying our world; love alone can save the world. If Baal be God, serve him. But if the Father of Jesus Christ be God, serve Him."

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## WAITE MAY HAVE BEEN FORCED TO KILL PECKS

New Evidence Indicates Blackmailers May Have Been Hounding Him for Money

NEW YORK, April 7.—A new hint of blackmail—blackmail "before the fact"— crept into the Peck murder case yesterday with the revealton that the District Atwith the revelation that the District At-torney had been unable to trace several substantial amounts of money handled by Dr. Arthur Warren Waits within the last few months preceding the poisoning of the dentist's father-in-law and mother-



Furthermore, within a few hours of the head mailed with the control of within a few hours after he had malled the letter Doctor Waite telephoned to Mr. Spaulding and told him not to make out the check for \$15,000 to Kane, but to hold the money and await further instructions. Mr. Spaulding complied.
