

NANCY WYNNE SEES SOCIETY GOING CHURCHWARD MOST OF THE DAY

Last Days of Lent Are Spent More Thoughtfully by the Many Persons Who Compose Society—This Afternoon Will See Seashore Exodus

MOST every one will spend some part of the last 12 hours in church during this most solemn time of Lent, and then Easter joy will come in with the fitting toward the sea of beaux and belles, sires and dames, and who shall say that "Solomon in all his glory" was ever arrayed as will be the participants in the Easter parade on the great Wooden Way of Atlantic City. If only this weather continues, and it seems as if it might! Think of last Easter morning, when we all awoke to see a blanket of snow more than a foot deep in some places over the ground. Still, that is not likely to happen this season, for it is a whole fortnight later than last year; about all one could have to fear would be an April shower. Such old lovers of the "City by the Sea" as Mrs. Jason Waters have gone down from New York for the Easter season; the Princess Pignatelli d'Aragon, in other words, Ruth Waters, is already there with her mother, and her twin sister, Mrs. Ben Gatins, will go down later with her father and join the family party.

Unusual enthusiasm was aroused at the luncheon at the Hotel Adelphi yesterday noon by those interested in the assembling of a citizens' army of 48,000 soldiers, the chief work of which is being done by the Drexel Biddle "rookies." A number of well-known women and men were in attendance and plans were arranged for the campaign for the half million of dollars which it is hoped to raise for the cost of the army.

Many women have arranged to captain teams who will collect the money. Several of the most ardent have already gotten together two teams. Is all the world going Shakespeare crazy? It seems so, and yet his immortal name and fame should surely be celebrated on this year, the tercentenary of his death. One of the most interesting affairs to be given for this occasion will be the festival which has been gotten up by the Philadelphia Committee for the Shakespeare tercentenary, and which will take place in the Academy of Music on Friday afternoon, May 12, at 2 o'clock.

Sir Henry Beerbohm Tree will deliver the commemorative address on "Shakespeare's Art." Mr. David Bispham will sing a number of Shakespearean songs and, best of all, will recite "The Seven Ages of Man," with musical accompaniment.

Mrs. Otis Skinner is to read Ben Jonson's "Ode," and Mr. Alfred Noyes, who has written an ode specially for the tercentenary, will read it at the time. Then, besides this, a chorus of 200 women, chosen from the Mahler Symphony chorus, under the direction of Henry Gordon Thayer, will sing, and members of the Philadelphia Orchestra will contribute music incidental to Shakespeare plays.

The Fortnightly Club, which includes 70 men, will also sing Shakespeare songs. Old English dances will, in all probability, be given as well, if the program does not prove too long.
