P. R. T. CARMEN GET ADVANCE OF 1 CENT AN HOUR FROM MAY

Increase Follows Threat of 6200 Employes to Organize Into Union Body for Demands

ALL EMPLOYES BENEFIT

The Philadelphia Rapid Transit Com-pany has announced an increase in wages of I cent an hour to apply to all motor-men and conductors and another increase for employes in the electrical and mefor employes in the electrical and me-chanical departments. The increase for the carmen will affect about 6200 men, and will be effective on May 1.

The action by the company follows a move made by the carmen's union several weeks ago to have the men organize in order to fight for higher wages.

The maximum wage under the schedule just announced is 31 cents an hour for all carmen who have been in the service five years or longer. In effect it advances the old schedule of wages uniformly. Whereas the old schedule offered 25 cents an hour to new men with an increase of one cent an hour for each year of service up to five consecutive years to 30 cents, the new order will start apprentices at 26 cents, the increase being paid in the same ratio. When the Stotesbury management took charge of the property the maximum wage was 23 cents an hour. This action was decided upon at a meet-

ing of the Co-operative Committee, made up of representatives of men and employers, held at 8th and Dauphin streets. The money for the carmen's increase will be provided from what is known as the 22 per cent, fund. The Rapid Transit Company, under the co-operative plan of 1911 lays aside 22 cents out of every dollar faken in fares to provide higher wages, benefits and pensions for the men. According to a statement issued by the

Transit Company last night, 75 per cent. of the total number of carmen, or more than 3500, are now drawing 30 cents an hour and will be eligible to the 31-cent maximum under the new scale. Within the next few months an additional 5 per cent, would come into this class, making 80 per cent, who will draw the maximum


