

# NANCY WYNNE IS INTERESTED IN LOAN COLLECTION AT ACADEMY

## A Private View of the John Howard McFadden Collection of English Artists' Work Will Be Given for Benefit of the Wounded Artists Abroad Today

AND now we have another way to raise money to help the suffering ones in the hospitals and on the battlefields in sunny France, as she has so often been called—France, which is making such a magnificent stand in the last weeks at Verdun. The money will be raised by means of a private view of the marvelous loan collection of John Howard McFadden at the Academy of the Fine Arts this afternoon. The collection includes the work of the eighteenth century English artists, than which there is no other collection so thoroughly representative of the time, not even in the Metropolitan Museum. It is the first time in the history of the city that so great a private collection has been loaned, and the value of the paintings is something colossal, though Mr. McFadden does not seem to think at all of their financial value, but with true appreciation judges them for their artistic value, which is greater far than mere money to him. I have heard that the collection is insured for at least a million and a half. The Academy, of course, realizes its responsibility in hanging and housing an exhibition so valuable, and they tell me the rooms will never be left unguarded night or day. The direct beneficiaries of the private exhibition will be the "Fraternalists Artists."

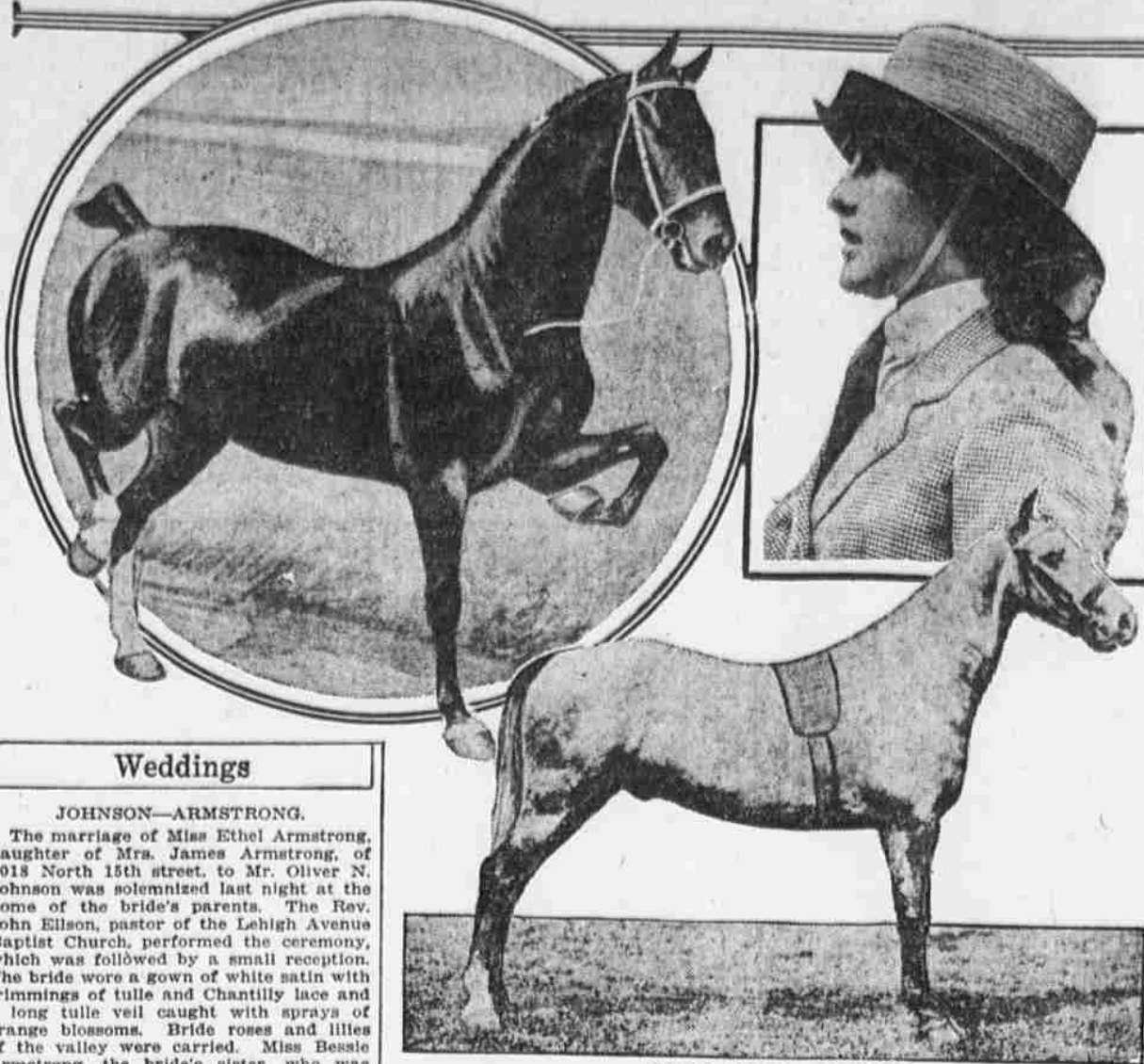
