ACCUMULATION IN MARINE ISSUES SENDS PREFERRED TO NEW HIGH MARK

Stock Advances Five Points-Bulk of Buying for American International Corporation-Movements in Leading Rails and Industrials Irregular

NEW YORK, April 29,

Important financial interests concentrated their attention today to the continued accumulation of Marine issues and the preferred stock held first place in the market movements all through the two hours of trading. The advance of 5 points in the first hour, carrying the price to above 90, made the preferred sell at a new high record.

No news came out while this buying was in progress, but those having most to do with handling the buying orders admitted that the bulk of the stock was taken for the American International Corporation, and they intimated strongly that the corporation will be found to have a quiet control of the International Mercantile Marine Company,

It is known that meetings of the various committees are being held daily, but no announcement of the results of these meetings has yet been made. Whatever statement comes will be issued by the Preferred Stockholders' Committee, and, according to information from high sources, any plan now proposed by that committee will be approved by the representatives of the common stockholders.

It is said that there is easily 10 points more of an upward movement in the mmon stock to be based on anticipated developments, the expectation being

that the preferred will cost par.

There were some other specialties which were forced into prominence, among them Maxwell Motors common, which rose more than 5 points. Outside of these specialties the movements in the leading rallroads and industrials were irregular, with the room traders selling some of these stocks at intervals because of the belief that the usual Saturday liquidation would give them a chance to cover

There was no outside supply, however, and the few concessions which were recorded in the half day reflected simply these traders' ventures. Bull leaders express themselves as well satisfied with the way the market acted, especially Reading and the copper stocks, and the fact that these leading

WHEAT STRONGER ON GOOD DEMAND

CHICAGO, April 29.-There was a fairly good demand for wheat this morning on lower temperatures in the spring wheat belt, and the market was stronger. Fears were renewed that seeding, already

GERMANS ADMIRE SPIRIT OF QUAKERS

Exchanged Prisoner Tells How Good They Are to Those Held

in British Camp BERLIN, April 29.-In an article in the Berliner Tageblatt a German who was as interned civil prisoner in a British con returned to Germany, describes the relie work given by the British Society Friends to imprisoned Germans in Grea

"The Quakers first appeared at the con centration camps in October, 1914," says the Overseas News Agency summary of the article. "They visited individually all the prisoners and made records of the destitute families left by them, and all these families received help from the Friends, the society also providing employment to such prisoners as were re-

"The Quakers furnished books and re views to the camps, and held lectures, which, however, were soon prohibited by the British authorities. They also pro-vided transportation for those allowed to return home, and distributed food to return home, and distributed food and clothing among destitute Germans who had been left at liberty, but being without employment were unable to provide for themselves. Records were kept of all these families, and the children in them received milk and healthful food. A woman physician was charged with the care of children and of women who were ill. The Quakers also invited destitue persons of alien birth into their homes and treated them there with cordiality and with the utmost tact.
