HAYDN CLUB. The Haydn Club of Oak Lane is no stranger to music lovers from other sections of the city. Long ago it had to seek larger and more central quarters as the merit of its achievement, and the variety of its programs enlarged its clientele and made it a Philadelphia and not merely a suburban institution.

Last night the Haydn Club, under the direction of Gertrude Hayden Fernley, ended its 12th season, which has been the most successful in its annals, with a delightful program in Horticultural Hall. This engaged the talents of the club in part songs and choral numbers by Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Grieg, Harris and others and the services of Mary Barrett, soprano; Florence Adele Wightman, harpist, and Gurney Mattox, violinist, as soloists.

The choral contributions were sung with agreeable and voluminous tone, technical proficiency and variety of mood in the interpretation. One of the notable features was "Snowflake," a well-written lyric by Carl Beatty, who conducted.

Miss Barrett has a very fine voice, flexible even in some of her solo work, and she displayed its several merits to advantage in Moriz Moszkowski's "Springtime of Love" and Clough-Diters' "My Love Comes on a Skiff."

Miss Wightman, who is already a musician of varied accomplishments, although only a 22-year-old girl, has made a number of notable appearances this season, but at none of them has her solo work so spirited and finished as last night at the Haydn concert. She fairly assailed the audience with the facility with which her fingers traversed the strings and with the ravishing effect they created.

Gurney Mattox also proved himself a "musical" entertainer in more than one way. His bowing was proficient and he produced a tone that was rounded and full and of considerable volume. It also had the merit of accuracy in intonation. The young man's version of Hubay's arrangement of Bizet's "Fantasie" was brilliant. With Miss Wightman he was also heard in duet.

Miss Fernley deserves great credit for the excellent results she has attained with her forces. William Sylvano Thunder was the efficient accompanist of both chorus and soloists.
